THE MARKETS.

Our Markets here have advanced to an unexpected height; Red Wheat, this day, brought from 15d. to 20d. per stone; and White, 19d. to 21d. per stone; Millers gave from 1s. 9d. to 1s. 10d. per stone, for both kinds. Notwithstanding these advanced rates, the Markets were very heavy and the buyers holding back; there were not much sales effected until the Farmers shewed a disposition to give way, when a decline of one penny took place from the above rates. The stock of Wheat at market was rather abundant—Oats, in demand, at 9½d. per stone, up.—Barley, 13d. and for real prime samples, 13½d. per stone—Flour has advanced to 44s. per bag, for Firsts; 38s. 4d. for Seconds; and 28s. for Thirds—Oatmeal, 13s. per cwt—Potatoes, 2½d. per stone—Pork, scalded, 39s. per cwt. for best; Singed ditto, 42s. to 44s. per cwt.—Beef, 4d. to 5d. per lb.—Mutton, 4d. to 5d.—Flax, in demand, at 3s. 10d to 4s. 4d. per stone, hand-scutched; Mill-scutched, 4s. to 4s. 8d. per stone.—Thread, 5J. and 5½d. per hank.—Pound Yarn, 8d. to 9d. per lb.—Herrings, up to 28s. per brl.—Wool, 17s. per stone.—Whiskey, at Distillery, steady at 7s. per gallon.—White Feathers in the rough, 12s. to 18s. per stone; Grey, ditto, 13s. per stone, according to quality—Rough Tallow, 6s. per stone, down.—Market Hides, 5s. 4d. to 5s. 5d. per stone.—Green Calf-skins, 3d. to 3½d per lb.—Kip and Runners, 4s. 8d. to 5s. per stone.

A great number of live Pigs were purchased at market, this day, and a fall of 2 shillings per cent was submitted.
