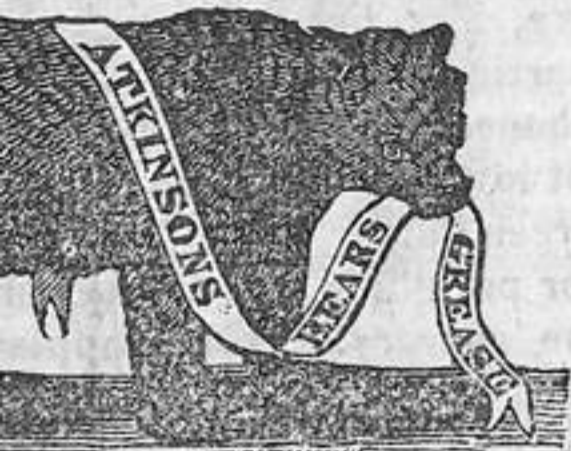

County Limerick, } An Adjournment of the GENERAL To Wit. } A QUARTER SESSIONS of the Peace for said County, for the purpose of granting CERTIFICATES to Publicans, will be held for the Division of LIMERICK, at Limerick, Wednesday, December 15th, 1824; at BRUFF, Monday, December 20, 1824—For the Division of RATHKEALE, at Rathkeale, Wednesday, December 22d, 1824—at which all persons desirous of obtaining Certificates to enable them to take out Licences for the retail of Malt and Spirituous Liquors for the Year commencing 5th January, 1825, are required to attend, together with their respective Sureties to be examined by the Court.

Persons residing at more than seven miles distance from the Sessions Towns above mentioned, must produce to the Court a Qualification signed by Two Justices of the Peace residing nearest to the place wherein they propose to keep a Public House, this qualification may be obtained by applying to the Justices at the Petty Sessions of the District. Persons obtaining this Qualification must, together with their Sureties, attend at the General Sessions of their respective Divisions for examination as aforesaid.

Although the supply of Wheat at our Market this day was small, sales were heavy, but good qualities suffered no depreciation—Red went from 20d to 1s 10d. per stone; and White, 21d. to 1s 11d per st.—Oats, in demand, at 11½d per stone—Barley, 14½d. per st.—Flour, 44s per bag for Firsts; 36s for Seconds; and 26s for Thirds—Oatmeal, 14s 6d per cwt—Potatoes, 2½d. per stone, and 3d per stone—Pork, 34s per cwt. (down); Singed, 40s. per cwt.—Beef, 4d. to 5d. per lb.—Mutton, 4d. to 5d per lb.—Flax, looking up, hand-scutched, 4s to 4s 4d per stone; Mill-scutched, 4s 4d to 4s 10d per stone—Hank Yarn, 5½d and 5½d per hank—Pound Yarn, 8½d 9d and 9½d per lb—Whiskey, without any further advance, 7s. 3d. per gallon—Rough White Feathers, 11s. to 10s.; and Grey, ditto, 12s. per stone, according to quality—Market Hides, 5s 8d to 5s 10d. per stone; Slaughtered ditto, 54s to 56s per cwt. for Cow, 56s to 60s per cwt for Ox; rough Tallow, 6s to 6s 3d per stone—Green Calf-skins, 3d. to 3½d per lb.—Kip and Runners, same as last—Galway Kelp, £4 11s per ton.
