ing was very dull, the state of the English market not war-
ranteeing the purchasers in giving the prices demanded by
farmers—Best Red from 20d to 1s 9½d per stone; and White,
ditto, 21d. to 1s 10½d per stone; and the latter only obtained
in a few instances—Oats are also coming down, and are
this day only 10½d per stone—Barley, 15d. per stone for
best—Flour, steady at 44s per bag for Firsts; 36s Seconds;
and 26s for Thirds—Oatmeal continues at 14s 6d per cwt.
—Potatoes, 2½d. per stone, and 3d per stone—Pork, scalded,
30s to 34s per cwt.; Singed, 41s. per cwt.—Beef, 4d to 5d.
per lb.—Mutton, 4d. to 5d per lb.—Flax, hand-scutched, 4s
to 4s 4d per stone; Mill-scutched, 4s 4d to 4s 10d per stone—

The extreme severity of the morning occasioned our
market to be very lightly supplied with Grain to-day, yet
to effect sales of Wheat lower prices must have been sub-
mitted to; there were however hardly any transactions in
Wheat, and we note Oats, Bere, and Barley nominally at
prices of last Friday; in other articles no alteration.
Butter has advanced to 110s. and some has brought 112s.
in the Dublin market.
