THE GENERAL QUARTER SESSIONS of the
PEACE for the COUNTY of LIMERICK will
 be held at LIMERICK, in and for the Division of
 Limerick, on MONDAY, the Fourth Day of APRIL
 next; and at RATHKEALE, in and for the Division
 of Rathkeale, on MONDAY, the Eighteenth Day of
 APRIL aforesaid.

 first day of the Sessions in each place.
 The Grand Jury will be sworn on the first Morning of
 the Sessions, and Crown Business immediately proceeded
 with; and all Jurors, Prosecutors, and others bound to

SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE.
 All the vessels in the Roads rode out the violent gale
 of the last few days in safety.
 The Adeona, from this port for Liverpool, which went
 ashore on the Hoghead rocks, with a cargo of wheat, oats,
 and beans, was built at New Brunswick in 1819, and re-
 gistered 256 tons. She was a very fine vessel, equal to
 300 tons. After discharging she lightened, and was
 brought up the river to Russell's-quay, on Thursday in a
 heavy swell, and her fore-mast only standing. She will
 be sold for the benefit of the underwriters, and torn up.
 Some tons of the cargo have been saved in a merchantable
 state, but the greater part has been destroyed by the water.
 The Weasel, from London to this Port, has put into
 Waterford.
 The Favourite, for Greenock, outward bound, and
 lying in the Pool, went ashore in the violent gale of Wed-
 nesday evening, but was got off immediately after with-
 out any injury.
