On Saturday, Patrick, alias Crozier Molony,
was identified in the new County Jail, from

of Daniel Connell, at Bilboa, in this County.

Michael Connell, one of the unfortunate suffer-
ers on the fatal night, was the person who recog-
nized him, on which occasion the most prudent
precautions were taken, with a proper regard to
the interests of the prisoner, to render certainty
comparably sure. Four of the murderers are now
fully identified, and will be tried at the ensuing
Spring Assizes, when a criminal calendar, more
ordinarily heavy, will have to exercise the
presence of a Court.

The Mills of Quartertown, the property of
John Dillon Croker, Esq. within a short distance
of Mallow, were at an early hour on Sunday
morning burned to the ground. It will be re-
collected that about two years ago, on the same
day, and at the same hour, they were burned
by some atrocious incendiaries ; and we have our
apprehensions that when an investigation which
is called for will take place before the Magis-
trates, it will appear to have its origin in similar
motives.
