

Included in the Catholic Rent received this week was 10l. 10s. from Knocklong.

The collection made after the sermon preached by Dr. Sadlier, on Sunday, in St. Anne's Church, for the Protestant School of that Parish, amounts to £203. 10s. 6d.

The Dean of Cork preached at the Castle Chapel on Sunday.

A Company is about to be formed for establishing Fly Vans to and from Cork and Dublin, which shall perform the journey to either place in 2 hours.

A man, calling himself Mr. Foley Williams, was yesterday committed to Newgate, for swindling Mr. Williams of goods to the amount of £340. and the Linen-hall to near 2000l.

The bills of indictment preferred against T. O'Reilly for keeping Gingles near his own concerns, at Baggot-street, represented to be a nuisance, are ignored by the Grand Jury.

The Mail to Ballyboy was robbed near Carrickmacross on Monday. The gang have been since apprehended.

Michael Deaton was shot by the Colliery Ranger at Castlecomer, while in the act of committing a robbery, on Friday night.

THE RENT AND THE ASSOCIATION.

The Association has published a statement of the receipts and expenditure of the Rent and subscriptions down to the 31st of December last, from whence it appears the whole sum received to that period amounted to £8785 10s. 0½d.; of which £7572 18s. 0½d. formed the Rent, and £1212 12s. the subscriptions. The amount of Expenditure, during the same period, amounted to £1343 0s. 2½d. leaving a balance in hand, and in Government securities, of £7437 9s. 10d. The only county from whence no rent has been received is Fermanagh; Derry has only subscribed £3 8s. 3d. and Donegal, only £6; Antrim, £29 9s.; and Tyrone, £27 9s. 2d. Cork County is the one from which the largest subscription has been received, and it amounts to £1509 11s. 1d. Dublin comes next, £874 10s. 11d.; and Kilkenny next to that £454 8s. 5d. The subscriptions from Leinster and Munster are nearly equal, about £3300 each; as are also those from Ulster and Connaught, about £500 each.

The expense consists chiefly of sums for printing Reports, providing Rent-books, and for law expenses and fees to Barristers and Agents, sent to different parts of the country. The largest item is a sum of £150 for printing 150,000 Reports; next to that is £86 13s. 4d. remitted to Mr. Eneas McDonnell to meet contingent expenses; then there is a sum of about £76 paid to the favoured Newspapers for advertising. Law expenses are tolerably heavy to the Association, as may be evidenced by the following statement:—

By the annual estimates it appears that the army is to be increased 2000, exclusive of the votes for India service.

Fifteen Midshipmen underwent the customary examination in the theoretical parts of navigation, at the Royal Naval College, on Monday evening, and received certificates of qualification.

The Military Riding School, under the management of Colonel Peters, at Pimlico is, in April next, to be removed to St. John's Wood Barracks, where stabling for 130 horses will be required.

Colonel Reeves, 27th Regiment, is appointed a Military Knight of the Royal Guelphic Order, in consideration of his services while in command of the German Legion at Col d'Ordal, in Spain.

There are no promotions in Tuesday's Gazette.

Sir R. Farquhar was elected, on Friday, Representative for the Borough of Newton, Lancashire, in place of Mr. Cloughton.

Bede! Stanford, Esq. has been sworn High Sheriff of the County Cavan, and William Bell, Esq. Sub-Sheriff.

The High Sheriff of the County of Clare has appointed Mr. Pat. Davoren, of Ennis, his Assistant in Office, and will not employ a Sub-Sheriff.

Loftus A. Tottenham, Esq. of Glanoid Priory, has been appointed a Magistrate of the County Leitrim.

The Lord Lieutenant has appointed the Rev. Hugh Leslie to be Dean of Connor, and the Rev. Theophilus Blakely to be Dean of Achonry, vice Green resigned.

The Parishioners of Ballymore have presented an address, regretting the departure of the Rev. H. Brownrigg their late Curate, who has succeeded Mr. Maturin, at St. Peter's, Dublin.

In consequence of the Lord Lieutenant's indisposition, the Levees are postponed to the 28th of February and the 7th of March; and the Drawing-Rooms to the 3d and 10th of March.

A meeting was held in Cork on Tuesday, for the purpose of forwarding the arrangements of the Rail Road between that City and Limerick. The following Committee was named for that object:—Sir J. C. Anderson, Bart. Messrs. Beamish, Morgan, De La Cour, Leader, Crawford, James Daly, David Roche (Carass), Gerald Callaghan, D. Murphy, Thomas Carroll, and Edward Foott. Mr. Dan Callaghan (President of the Committee of Merchants,) adverted to the refusal of the Limerick Chamber of Commerce to co-operate, and maintained that there were no grounds for the apprehension of injury to the trade of that port, but on the contrary the best results were likely to follow. He alluded to the high rate of freights in Limerick, and to the disadvantages of their harbour, where vessels were detained so frequently by contrary winds—and contrasted them with the decided advantages of the spacious harbour of Cork, reduced rates of freightage, and the facility which the intended Railroad admitted of, in transporting their goods from one port to another at a cheap rate.

Messrs. Tidmarsh and Benner are about commencing an extensive Distillery in the Town of Tralee.

The Old Jail at Ennis has been given up for a Linn Hall.

On Wednesday evening, Judith Bressan fell dead in the street at Boherbue, of apoplexy.

On the same evening, James Keogh, an hostler, was thrown from a horse in Shannon-street, and received so severe a contusion, that he died in a few hours after.

John Carroll, a malster, employed in the Brewery of Messrs. Roy and Co. in John's-street, accidentally fell from one of the lofts, upon the pavement, on Wednesday night, and was killed on the spot.

Inquests were held on the above three cases on Thursday, which make the number holden since last Assizes by the Mayor, 44.
