ASSIZES INTELLIGENCE.

The Hon. Justice Torrens, presiding in the County,
 has not, up to yesterday, gone into any important trials.
 The following is an abstract of the cases investigated in
 the Criminal Court:—

James Hambleton, for stealing on the 7th September last
 2l. from Daniel Milan, at Mountpelier. The prosecutor
 swore to the robbery committed on the fair day, and the
 prisoner was convicted, and sentenced to 7 years trans-
 portation.

John Walsh, for stealing on the 22d of August last a
 watch, chain, and two seals, the property of John
 Dowling, of Newcastle. The prisoner got the watch to
 repair, with which he absconded from Newcastle; but
 was shortly arrested. He was found guilty, and sen-
 tenced to seven years transportation: and other indict-
 ments against him for similar charges were not proceeded
 into.

Patrick and Thomas Webb and *James Bennett*, for the
 murder of Michael Gorman, jun. and attacking the
 house of Michael Gorman, sen. on the 28th December,
 1821. It appears the opinion of the twelve Judges had
 been taken on this case, and the prisoners were discharged
 without trial, from circumstances connected with an ac-
 complice of theirs, who was convicted on exceptional
 evidence at a former

Judith Mahony, for stealing a pair of shoes at the
 of Croagh, on the 1st of December, the prop ty of John
 O'Donnell.—Guilty.

Bridget Shelton, same offence.—Guilty.

Timothy Cronin, for stealing on the 30th November a
 sheep and two lambs, the property of James Molony.—
 Guilty.

John Slattery, for the murder of Michael Bainbridge a
 Attyflin, on the 6th June. The deceased, it was sworn
 by his widow, was struck on the head with a stone by the
 prisoner, without any provocation, and died next day.
 No quarrel whatever existed. Witness, on cross examina-
 tion, admitted she heard prisoner was insane, suppose
 from jealousy. The insanity of the unfortunate man
 was clearly established, and he was accordingly acquitted.

Michael and Mathew Hayes, for the murder of Thomas
 Collins, at Cappamore, on the 13th December. The
 deceased it appeared was killed in one of those frequent
 party fights, so disgraceful and injurious to the character
 of the Country, which occurred at Cappamore the above
 day. The prisoners got a good character, and were ac-
 quitted by the jury.

Thomas Finn, for stealing, on the 15th November, two
 cows, the property of Timothy Foran. The prisoner
 was acquitted.

John Gleeson, for stealing a sheep from Catherine
 Benson, at Kilsenny, on the 27th December—guilty.

Juliana O'Mara, for having in her possession two
 pieces of base coin, with intent to utter, at Mountpelier,
 on the 7th September. The prisoner's guilt was proved,
 and she was sentenced to three months' imprisonment
 and hard labour.

Patrick and Morty Neville, *Patrick and Michael Fe-
 Gerald*, *John, Edward*, and *James Fitz-Gibbon*, *John
 M'Inerney*, *Daniel*, *Patrick*, and *John Guiltinane*, *John
 and Michael Nealon*, were tried and acquitted of a burglary
 in the house of James Lynch, at Kilbreedy, on the night
 of the 25th January, as the prosecutor could not or would
 not swear to their identity, although he had done so in
