ASSIZES INTELLIGENCE.

The Hon. Justice Torrens, presiding in the County has not, up to yesterday, gone into any important trials, The following is an abstract of the cases investigated in the Criminal Court :-

James Hambleton, for stealing on the 7th September last 21. from Daniel Milan, at Mountpelier. The prosecutor swore to the robbery committed on the fair day, and the prisoner was convicted, and sentenced to 7 years transportation.

John Walsh, for stealing on the 22d of August last a watch, chain, and two seals, the property of John Dowling, of Newcastle. The prisoner got the watch to repair, with which he absconded from Newcastle; but was shortly arrested. He was found guilty, and sentenced to seven years, transportation : and other indictments against him for similar charges were not proceeded into.
