EXECUTION.

On Monday, Timothy Ryan and John Diegan were executed in front of the County Jail, pursuant to their sentence, for the cruel murder of Daniel Connell, at Bilboa.

The morning was very inclement, and a cold wind accompanied by heavy showers which continued during the entire day, so far checked the anxiety of the populace to witness the execution, that at two o'clock, the crowd in front of the prison was considerably less than what is usually observed on such melancholy occasions.

A very general rumour prevailed, that a respite had been received for the unfortunate culprits, from some favourable circumstances which, it was said, had been disclosed subsequent to their trial, and a report of which had been sent after the Judges to Tralee. Whatever degree of credit might have been attached to this statement, no order had, at all events, been received, to stay the preparations for the execution, by half-past two o'clock, when the Sheriff arrived at the Jail, and the necessary arrangements having been completed in half an hour after, the two victims of the outraged laws were led forth from their cells, attended by the Rev. Messrs. Tuohy, Hogan and Molony, Roman Catholic Clergymen.

Ryan was a tall, strong, able-bodied man, apparently not more than 30 years of age, dressed in white flannel jacket and trowsers, and preserved a florid healthy complexion throughout—Diegan, on the contrary, was a miserable looking creature, shabbily dressed, at least 60 years of age, infirm, and leaning frequently for support on one of the Clergymen; he presented a pale, haggard, and dejected appearance, and was an object of compassion to the surrounding spectators. On the platform he shook and trembled with every blast of wind, and it was apprehended he would have fallen, with mere weakness, under the scaffold, before the fatal operation had been consummated.—His companion, Ryan, retained his firmness and his colour unchanged from the first moment, and was solely occupied with his devotions, to the exclusion of every external object. After reciting the Litany of the Roman Catholic Church, and some other prayers, they prepared for their exit.

Ryan turned about and faced the people, whom he addressed in a few words, begging their prayers for his soul, declaring that he had not hand, act or part, in the murder for which he was now about to suffer, that he was perfectly innocent, and that he forgave his prosecutors! When he had concluded, Diegan assumed an unexpected energy, and spoke in a loud firm voice, most earnestly entreating the prayers of all good Christians, protesting that he was as innocent of the murder charged against him as the child unborn; that he was neither present at it, nor knew of it; and that he sincerely forgave his prosecutors!! These declarations at such an awful moment, produced a profound impression on the multitude, who echoed back their last words with audible aspirations to Divine Providence in their favour. The Clergymen took their farewell of the unhappy men, who were, in an instant, launched into a dread eternity.—Diegan died in a short time, but Ryan struggled for a longer period in convulsions.

The popular belief of their innocence was strengthened by an expression of one of the attending Clergymen, who was heard to say, that he had no reason whatever to doubt the truth of the declaration they had made. After hanging the usual time, their bodies were taken down and transferred to the County Infirmary, for dissection, amid the deep lamentations of their numerous friends.

Ryan was an unmarried man, but Diegan was a man of family and the father of six children, who are left in a destitute condition.
