The fourth anniversary of the heir to the estates of Sir
John A. De Bourgho, Bart. was celebrated in the beau-
tiful village of Castle-Connell, on Monday, with every
joyous festivity.

Wednesday last, John Cox, Esq. Coroner, held an
inquest on the body of Thomas Kent, a cripple, 7 years
old, at Ballinakally, near Pallaskey, who came by his
death in consequence of injury done to him by a party of
insurgents, who forcibly entered the dwelling-house of
his father, Thomas Kent, on the night of the 4th inst.
whom they struck on the head with the butt of a gun,
and afterwards flogged, to compel him to surrender his
ground.—Verdict accordingly.

On Thursday, Mr. Cox held another inquest at Mone-
gea, near Newcastle, on the body of Patrick Doolan, a
pedlar, who died suddenly on the road. In his pocket
were found 14 tenpennies and seven-pence. Verdict—
Died by the visitation of God.

Two cows were yesterday stopped at Ballinacurra
Turnpike, by the custom man, and the driver of them
committed to the Police-office—he has since acknow-
ledged that he stole them.

About eleven o'clock on Thursday night, six fellows
attempted to force their way into the County Hospital,
first at the door, and afterwards at the windows, but be-
ing observed by some of the servants, they desisted, and
made off.

A burning, which it is strongly suspected was malici-
ous, took place the night before last, on the property of
A. Uvedale, Esq. near Fermoy.

On Wednesday evening, a fire accidentally broke out
in the concerns of Mr. D. Brown, John-street, which
was got under by the prompt exertions of the Artillery
and Atlas fire engines, assisted by General Sir John
Elley and the Military, before any serious injury was
sustained.

West Muskerry, Orrery, and Kilmore.
