

... from his master George Roe, Esq., County Tipperary, from whence he was taken on the 22d March last—The robbery was not completed five days after his departure—He has been recovered about 700l. of the money recovered.

... a bailiff of Sir William Curtis, has been taken with embezzling several sums of money at his capacity; and his examination is postponed for his defence.

... of Biddestone, Esq. and his son-in-law, were wounded a few days ago by the former very seriously. The same man was so dangerously wounded a few days ago, that he suffered amputation of one of his legs.

... was summoned before the Magistrate on Thursday, for breaking the windows of Mrs. Kilner, and fined 12s. and costs.

... Mr. Jarvis, a butcher, died of hydrophobia after having been bitten by his own dog.

... held on Tuesday on the bodies of Mrs. Anne Martin, aged 93, and Mrs. Anne Martin, who were both burned to death the same evening after catching fire.

... and Mr. Graham, the aeronauts, both of whom were last week—the former from the City, and the latter from near Kew bridge, and both of whom were taken to the County Sessions this week, Mathew Lowther, Esq., and John Stafford, cabinet-makers, were convicted of conspiracy and assaulting a man named Johnson, a member of their own trade, who was signated "a black" as not conforming to the regulations.

... the Assizes, in the case *Poolly v. Pybus*, a verdict was had for the Plaintiff. It was an unusual case, and without any reasonable cause, several Commissions of Bankruptcy were issued.

... her, of the India Company's Service, was taken from his boat in the wake of a steam boat, and died of a considerable swell.

... in, a young gentleman, of Rathbone, was killed by drowning yesterday, near the bridge, but was fortunately caught after sinking.

... Lees, and Mr. Gideon Ousley have been appointed to the Committee on the state of Ireland. A meeting of opposite feeling is expected at the next meeting, on the subject of the 40s. free-

... of one Hanraghan, of Tyenies, in this County, a respectable farmer, and threatened to set fire to it if he dared to persevere in a process case at the next Quarter Sessions; they broke all the windows and the door. The party then proceeded to the house of one Summers, of Lisbane, and threatened him with death if he would not quit his farm, which he had lately taken.—They then proceeded to Kilcoleman, where they broke into the dairy-house of Mr. Meade, and threatened two of his servant girls with death if they did not quit the place.—These ruffians also set fire to a house, the property of Mrs. Fitz-Gerald, out of which she had ejected a tenant named Quade for non-payment of rent, and it is rather a remarkable circumstance that the people who were living in it did not lose one article of furniture, although the house was totally consumed.—Mr. Creagh, of Waterville, with his usual promptitude, attended by Chief Constable Smith, are making every possible enquiry relative to these outrages, and hopes are entertained of discovering those concerned.

On Saturday last, some people went to execute a decree at the Cross-Keys, near Newport; they seized some cattle belonging to a man named Carey, which he followed; a large mob having collected, one of the persons who seized the cattle received a blow of a stone in the head, of which he died in a few hours. An inquest was held by J. Bennett, Esq. Coroner—Surgeon Franklin examined the body, and was of opinion that the blow received on his head was the cause of his death. The verdict of "Wilful murder against the owner of the cattle, Carey, and three others," was returned—they have not yet been taken. The Hon. William Massy, the Rev. Mr. Crampton, the Rev. Mr. Pennefather, Mr. Balmer, Chief Constable, and many Gentlemen attended the inquest.

On the night of Monday, the 4th inst. an armed party of insurgents broke into the house of a man named Thomas Kent, at Ballinahalee, near Pallaskenry, whom they flogged severely, and in the interim overturned a cradle, in which a young boy slept, aged about 7 years, and trampled on his body, by reason of which he died on the following day. On Wednesday, Lieut. Lawrenson, Chief Constable, attended at a Coroner's Inquest that was held on the body of the deceased child, when the Jury returned the following verdict:—"That the deceased child came by his death in consequence of injury done to his body by a party of insurgents, who forcibly entered the house of Thomas Kent, who resides on the lands of Ballinahalee, in said County."

Same night, a party of armed insurgents attacked the house of Michael Meade, of Fereagh, whom they beat in a most shocking manner. It is hoped the offenders will be brought to justice.

On the night of Wednesday, the 6th inst. the house of a poor man named Philip Sheahan, living near Pallaskenry, was maliciously set fire to and consumed.

Same night, an inflammatory notice was sent to Mr. James Hill, Post-Master of Pallaskenry.

On the night of Monday, a house, the property of Mr. Griffin, at Boherbee, near Palliskerry, was set fire to, and totally consumed. Mr. Laurensen, C. C. and the Constables under his command, were almost immediately on the Lands, but were unable to render the least assistance. The house was unoccupied, as Mr. Griffin, the Landlord, resides in Rathkeale. A tenant was to have entered into possession yesterday.

The County Clare, from one end to the other, is in a state of perfect tranquillity; and it is intended to remove Captain Warburton from the command of the Police, and thus dispense with the services of this active Officer, owing to the above circumstance. The unremitting vigilance and activity of the Police has been most creditable in producing this gratifying state of repose.

A second daring but fruitless attempt was made on Monday night to rob the County Infirmary, and the fellows were discovered before they could effect an entrance.

On Saturday the house of a man named Hogan residing in the suburbs of Kinnis was robbed in his absence of £20, in silver.

We are assured that the long expected Bill will not take place, as anticipated, on the 23d inst. in consequence the nomination of Officers to the various companies is delayed.

The 66th Regiment, stationed at Boyle, in a most advanced state of discipline, expect to be ordered to embark by the General Officer of that district.

The head-quarter division of the 31st Regiment of Foot Guards, will embark forthwith at Chatham for India.

The first battalion of the 60th Rifles are ordered to embark at Weedon.

The Junior Officers of the three Regiments of Foot Guards are employed in learning the new method of drill lately introduced into the army by Sir H. B. Essex.

The late Earl of Balcarras was one of the Generals in the army, having been 38 years in the service.

The Officers of the 15th Hussars gave a dinner and supper in Cork, last night, to the Officers and Gentry.

The duty on Wine on hands, between the 1st of February and 12th March last, is to be reduced, in consequence of the reduction made by the last Act of Parliament from the excise department.

On Wednesday four Engineers, from the 1st Mining Company, arrived in Tralee, and on Thursday they are engaged examining the mines.

Richard Wallis Gould Adams, of Jamaica, is appointed a Magistrate of the County of Cork.
