THE COMMITTEE of the County Agricultural Association give notice, of a PLOUGHING MATCH, granted by the FARMING of IRELAND for this and the adjoining

to be held on TUESDAY, the 26th inst. the following are the Conditions and Prizes:
Class 1—To the person who shall plough of ground in the best manner, with one mules, bulls, oxen, or heifers, in reins, with a Silver Cup.
To the next best ditto, ditto, an Iron Silver Medal.
Class 2—To the Ploughman who shall plough £3. To the next best, ditto, £2.
Class 3—To the Farmer holding his own land, having it held by his son; or, if the Widow, having it held by her son, who shall plough of ground in the best manner, with one mules, bulls, oxen or heifers, in reins, with £5. To the next best, ditto, £3.
Class 4—To each of the five best of the Candidates in Class 3, provided they shall plough well with the improved plough and their own oxen, each.

N. B.—Claimants in Class 3, at more than one mile from the Plough Field, will be allowed one mile for each mile beyond ten, that they shall be provided—that the ploughing be good, and that the Candidates shall be of the age of 18 years and upwards.

CONDITIONS.

Candidates in Class 3 may come in company with Candidates in Class 1—and, should they be successful there, will be entitled to the prizes in both classes respectively.—The object of this condition is to encourage the *Working Farmer* the prize in their own events, and to encourage them by throwing the other Class, to give them the chance of success, should they have merit and skill. Any Candidate shall be disqualified whose plough is drawn by any means except the Plough, or the foot of a man as the Plough works, or who suffers a hitch to the poles, settling of irons, or otherwise to the Ploughman.

The Candidates must enter their names in writing with Mr. ANTHONY BODKIN, at the City Limerick, three days previous to the 26th inst. the day the Match is to take place.
