language. Lady Anne Bernard was pleasing in her
person, elegant and polished in her manners, a zealous
patroness of merit, and a benevolent friend to misfortune
and distress. Her knowledge of the world, general intel-
ligence, pure taste, and amiable disposition, rendered
her the ornament of the high society with which she was
intimately connected, and an honour to her sex. She
was sister to the late Earl of Balcarras and to the present
Countess of Hardwicke.
