In consequence of the incessant and indefatigable exertions of the Rev. George Vincent, with the Police, to discover and apprehend those charged with the murder of Culhane, at Robertstown, in this County, one of them was so closely pursued that he has surrendered himself to the above Magistrate, and two or three others of them have been arrested.

An inquest was held at the County Infirmary, on Monday, on the body of John Ryan, of Lackamore, who was murdered near Lehid, coming from the Fair of the Silvermines on the 2d inst. A verdict of Wilful Murder was returned against John and Patrick Ryan, of Foilduff, in this County.

The Rev. Mr. Murnane, Parish Priest of Kilmallock, was assaulted in his house on Sunday by two men named Conway, brothers, one of whom got the Priest's finger into his mouth, and was very near severing the two upper joints between his teeth. The Clergyman has very properly sworn informations against the fellow.

On Saturday last, a young girl, Catherine M'Carthy, was rolled over by a car in John-street, and killed on the spot. An inquest was held, and a verdict of accidental death returned, but a fine of 20s. was levied on the horse and car, and given to the mother of the child.

On Saturday evening, a young woman accidentally fell into the river near the Jail, and would have perished but for the intrepidity of a soldier of the 81st Regiment, on guard, who instantly leaped in, and saved her.

In William-Street, on Saturday, a painter named Donoghue, inflicted a deep and severe wound with a chisel, on a man of the name of Brown, who, in company with a constable, attempted to arrest him. The weapon penetrated his arm, and nearly touched his ribs. He continues in a dangerous state, but fortunately the perpetrator is in custody.

On Monday morning, a female, in a state of mental suffering, leaped into the river at Cork, but was rescued in time by Mr. C. Sugrue, of that City.

John Fitzgerald, driver of a Brewer's dray, laden with porter, was rolled over on Sunday, on his way to Abbeyseale, and dreadfully lacerated in the leg and foot.

A young woman named Johanna Barry, was rolled over, by a horse and car taking head, near Ardmore, on Monday, and had her leg fractured.

The Police of Kilmallock stopped a cow on Friday, supposed to be stolen.

The adjourned Quarter Sessions commenced yesterday, at the Tholsel Court, before the Recorder.

Michael Sullivan, for assaulting James O'Neill, to be imprisoned one week, and give security to keep the peace for 5 years.—Elizabeth Wilson, a noted character on the town, to be imprisoned two months, for an assault on Richard Hayes.—Patrick, James, and John Meehan, for assailing John Gallagher, to be imprisoned one month each, and the former to pay the prosecutor 2l. as a composition, or be further imprisoned 6 months.—
John Purcell, for buying and receiving a quantity of stolen rope the property of Thomas Parker, to be imprisoned for one month, and pay the King a fine of 10l.—
