This morning, as Mr. William White and his Lady
were coming into town in a gig, the horse took fright

leaped over, and fell, when, most providentially, Mr.
and Mrs. White got out, without the slightest injury.
An industrious farmer, Patrick Currane, of Ballyna-

trapped in a bog-hole in his neighbourhood, on Tuesday,
from which it is supposed he was thrown by some ruffians,
from whom he unfortunately detected in the barbarous act of
killing a horse.
A poor man was flung from a horse into the sea, at
Ballybunnion, on Monday and perished.
An inquest was held by the Mayor on Sunday, on the
body of Michael Molloy, who was rolled over by a car
at Thomond-Bridge, the preceding Thursday—Verdict,
"Accidental death."
On Monday evening, a man of the name of Danagher
of Tralee, accidentally fell off the extreme end of the
Long Dock into the river. He was taken up in a few
minutes, but every effort to restore animation unhappily
failed. An inquest was held on the body, and a verdict of
"Accidental Death," returned.
On Monday morning, a party of Rockites, on the
lands of Graigue, cruelly beat Edward Callanan and
Patrick Nowlan, tenants of Richard Trench, Esq. who
were engaged ploughing for that Gentleman.
Two thatched houses were burned in the vicinity of
Nenagh, on Saturday.
A man named Lawless was found dead on the Castle-
omer road, a few days since, with marks of violence on
his body, and some persons, in whose company he had
been, are committed to prison.
