**MELANCHOLY EVENT.**—Saturday last, Mr. George Dodd, a young lad, went to bathe near Annfield, County Clare, on the Shannon, and was unfortunately drowned, as was also, in endeavouring so save him, a boy named Meskile. Mr. Dodd was son of Mr. William Dodd late of this City.

A very melancholy accident occurred on Friday, in the neighbourhood of Miltown, County Kerry, by the incautious use of fire arms. Mr. Francis Newton was loading his gun to try the temper of his horse, when the charge unexpectedly exploded, and killed on the spot a faithful servant of his. An inquest was held by E. McGillicuddy, Esq. and the usual verdict returned.

Mr. David Fennessy, a respectable Apothecary in Waterford, whose absence for the last ten days had occasioned great uneasiness, was found drowned in the Suir, above Moncoyne, on Saturday, with his gold watch and some sovereigns in his pocket.

John Kennedy, a near neighbour of John Currane, of Corkaguiny, Co. Kerry, who was found murdered in a bog-hole, is committed to Tralee Gaol, on very strong suspicion of being a principal in that crime.

A barn and out office, the property of Thomas Milet, Esq. near Littleton, were consumed on Wednesday night, by malicious incendiaries, and the dwelling house was very near falling a prey to the flames.

The beautiful cottage of Edward Denroche, Esq. near Sheastown, Kilkenny, was burned down on Wednesday night, and there is too much reason to believe with a malicious intent.

At the fair of Limerick, on Monday last, pigs were higher than for some time back—Cork buyers attended to purchase for exportation; yearlings and two years declined a little, 3*l.* 15*s.* to 4*l.* 11*s.* for the former, and 6*l.* 10*s.* to 8*l.* for the latter; a great number of bad horses in little demand, but good in requisition by English buyers.

The fair of Limerick on Monday, gave birth to several fighting matches in the evening, between various folks returning from the green, and some of the streets were much disturbed by the noisy contests of the disputants. Five of the chief rioters were apprehended in Roche's-street by the police, who preserved order and regularity in the fair during the day.

A man named Nehane was killed and several others severely wounded, in a dreadful affray, at the fair of Ballygurteen, on Friday.

An extensive seizure was made by the Revenue Police in Galway, on Sunday night, in the premises of a most respectable inhabitant.

On Monday, Thomas Dwyer, a workman in the Canal Brewery, met with a most dreadful accident. He was regulating a strap belonging to a part of the Machinery, when one of the cogs caught him by the leg and drew him into the works, by which both limbs were so severely crushed that amputation was deemed instantly necessary, on being conveyed to the Infirmary. His life is in a very precarious state.

William Connell, a slater, fell from the roof of a house he was repairing in Change-Lane, on Thursday, and one of his legs was severely injured, besides contusions on the body.

John Slyne, with a fractured thigh, from Croom, and Mary Magrath, with fractured skull, have both been admitted to the County Infirmary.

A young child of Mr. Thomas Quinlan, of Kilmallock, was rescued almost from under the feet of the horses of the Cork Mail-Coach, by the exertions of Mr. William Connell, of the former place, on Thursday.

The following have been convicted at the Quarter Sessions of Bruff, where the Civil business has not yet terminated:—James Potter and James Casey, for a violent assault, to be imprisoned six months each, to pay the prosecutor five pounds, and to give security for their future good behaviour—Mary Bush, for an assault, to be imprisoned three months; and John Conway and Patrick Griffin, for a similar offence, to be imprisoned fourteen days each.

On the 1st of July, as it appears by ancient custom, a flag was hoisted on the Round Tower of Roscrea;—by order of a Magistrate it was shortly after taken down, and in the evening it was carried in triumph through the town, and subsequently burned, at the head of a large multitude of persons. A meeting of the Protestant Inhabitants was held, to take the subject into consideration, and Resolutions passed which will be found in our Advertising Columns. We have seen a letter from Roscrea dated this morning, which states—"Another flag like a Phoenix arose from the ashes of the first, last night, and this day an immense mob broke open the door of the Tower, pulled down the flag, cut it in pieces, gave the fragments to a multitude of Boys who proceeded with them through the town, with horrid yells—all this without interruption from the Police."

The Parishioners of Golden, have offered 900*l.* per annum to the Rev. Irwin Whitty, in lieu of tithes, which he has refused. The sum demanded by the Rev. Gentleman is 1200*l.* a-year.
