Bourke, at Rathnasere; James Garret Fitzgerald, and James Keane, for burglary in the dwelling of Patrick Cleary, at Hospital; and Patrick Connolly, for burglary in the dwelling of Patrick Sullivan, at Kilmacat. No respite has been received for Connor Keating, the accomplice of Wall, who is to be hanged on this day week, the 17th inst.

Mary Dubigg and Mary Ryan, under sentence of seven years transportation since last Assizes, for stealing ribbons were, yesterday, by an order from Dublin, transmitted from the City Gaol to the Richmond Penitentiary. On Monday last, the noted Sheahan was transmitted from hence, under a Guard of Police to Cork, to prosecute persons charged with murdering the Franks' family. On Friday night, two excellent milch-cows and a heifer were stolen off the lands of Tinnerana, Co. Clare, one the property of Major Purdon, the remainder belonged to a tenant.

The 79th Highlanders, under Colonel Douglas, expect to embark on the 16th inst. at Cork, for Quebec.—The depot, consisting of Major Michell, Captains Riach, Forbes, and Young's companies, under command of Major Marshal, are to be stationed at Glasgow. A detachment of the 19th Regiment arrived in Cork, on Monday, and proceeded to occupy the quarters of the 79th Regiment, at Spike Island and the forts in Cork harbour.

Owing to the very imperfect state of the Barracks of Boyle, the head-quarters of the 34th Regiment were removed on Wednesday to Longford. Monday, that fine Regiment, the 72d Highlanders, which has been for many months stationed in Edinburgh, and now expects a route to Ireland, was presented with a new stand of colours, in Durantsfield Links, in presence of a vast concourse of spectators, many of whom were in carriages.

The 4th, 5th, 9th and 21st Regiments, in the West Indies since 1819, will return to this country against Christmas next. The Cavalry Barracks at Exeter being now in a complete state of repair, the 10th Royal Regiment of Hussars, from Bristol, which is to take the duty of the Western District, marched in on Wednesday and Thursday. A detachment belonging to the 4th Regiment of Dragoon Guards, embarked on the 15th ult. at Dublin, for Bristol, on route to the Riding Establishment at Fimlico.

The Hertfordshire Militia had a grand field day at St. Alban's, on Monday, previous to being disembodied, when a splendid breakfast was given by the Colonel the Marquis of Salisbury, to the officers of the regiment, and the Nobility and Gentry of the County. His Royal Highness the Duke of York has given Major Bulkeley (of his own Regiment, the Grenadier Guards) a Staff Appointment in the Southern District, &c. &c.

Second Lieutenant-Colonel, an additional Surgeon, and First Lieutenant to each Company, are to be added to the Ceylon Regiment, which now consists of 16 Companies of 100 rank and file. The long anticipated removal of the General Officers, that are Colonels en second, belonging to the Royal Regiment of Artillery and Corps of Engineers, will take place immediately. These officers only retire temporarily from their regimental commissions, and will be re-appointed to their regiments on vacancies occurring in the highest rank—viz., that of Colonel-Commandant.—The number of removes are as follows:—Artillery, sixteen; Engineers, eight. Consequently sixteen Lieutenant Colonels will have the important step of Colonel of the Artillery; likewise eight of the Engineers, and the promotion to go entirely through the Regiment.

An Order in Council directs that the ballot or enrolment, for the Local Militia shall be suspended until the 6th July, 1826. Major Colby, director of the Ordnance Survey, is now inspecting the numerous parties engaged on the Survey of Ireland, where operations are as yet confined to the North part of the Island. Antrim, Coleraine, and Londonderry, are head-quarters of the detachments, with a Captain of Engineers at each place. The Police Constabulary force is about to be established in the County of Down.

The Magistrates, Clergy, and Inhabitants of Dunravan, have publicly addressed Lieutenant W. Sadler, of the 58th Regiment, regretting his removal from their neighbourhood. His Majesty has appointed the Rev. James Hook to the Deanery of the Cathedral of Worcester; and the Rev. George Chandler to the District Rectory of All Souls, London.

The Senatus Academicus of the University of Edinburgh conferred, during the last Session, the degree of D. on the following Noblemen and Gentlemen, viz.: Most Noble the Marquis of Hastings, the Right Honourable the Earl of Dalhousie, the Right Honourable Peel, Sir Thomas Brisbane, K. C. B., Sir Thomas Ford Raffles.

Walter Scott Bart. arrived in Cork yesterday, from London. The money is now paying to the officers and crew of Majesty's sloop Fawn. The Collector of Excise in Waterford has been succeeded by Mr. Smith, an English gentleman. The twenty-one Excise Collectors in Ireland six to be filled by Irishmen, to be advanced from the order of Supervisors to that of Collectors.
