The body of a female infant, supposed to be a month old, mutilated, and in a state of nudity, was taken out of the dock at Arthur's-Quay, on Thursday last. The Mayor held an inquest thereon.

At the execution of Connor Keating, on Wednesday evening, shortly before he was turned off, the unfortunate man solemnly declared to those around him, that he was innocent of the crime for which he was to die—that he had neither hand, act, or part in the attack—he forgave Mr. Bourke, who, he knew, would not injure him if he was not mistaken—that Mr. Bourke had often served him—that he supplied him with turf for three years, and that he himself would be the worst of men, if he could be so ungrateful as to attempt his life.—This declaration he made in English; he, then, addressed the multitude in Irish, repeating the same thing—adding, that he never in his life was present at any nightly attack, but that he had been the means of saving the lives of three gentlemen against whom plots had been got up, which reached his knowledge.

Several women, the wives of Convicts who have been well conducted at Botany Bay, are now with their families in Cork, from whence they will be conveyed to join their husbands, at the expense of Government.

Government has determined on sending to New South Wales, three veteran companies, to be composed entirely of non-commissioned Officers, who are to retain their pensions. It is supposed these Companies are for the purpose of organizing a Police or Militia force in the Colony.

A detachment belonging to the 77th Regiment embarked, on the 11th instant, on board a vessel in the Thames, for Glasgow.

A detachment of the 68th Foot, under the command of a Subaltern, has been ordered to march from Chichester to the station of the Depot, to Portsmouth, to embark for Canada, to join the Regiment.
