## WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 31.

On the morning of Friday, the day after the fair of Rathkeale, a barbarous murder was ascertained to have been committed. A young man of the name of Charles Robertson, Steward and Gardener to Sir Aubrey Hunt, Bart, of Curragh, was found lying dead in a field at Cappah, not far from the scene of Major Going's murder. He was at the fair the day previous, and, on his return home in the evening, was way-laid and killed by some sanguinary wretches, who are not yet discovered .-His skull was beat in above the left ear, as if from the blow of a stone, and the fatal wound is believed to have originated in malice. He was a young man of good character, in the confidence of his master, respected by his fellows, and lamented by his acquaintance. Sir Aubrey Huntand the Police are making every exertion to investigate the ourrage, and to detect the murderers ; but, unfortunately, in cases of this kind, the Country people are very ill disposed to give any useful information.

On Sunday night last, a strong party of insurgents all well armed, attacked six farmers' houses on the lands of Mr. Rose, near Effin, in this County. They beat most severely, with heavy spade-handles and short clubs, to o of the farmers, Robert Tucker and James Casey, besides a man named Clohessy who was in the house of the former. They forced an entrance by breaking the windows and doors Major Maxwell, as a Magistrate, proceeded next morning to inquire into the circumstances, and learned that the party took some of the imnates? outside, and shewed them a well-dressed man on horseback, with a white sash and white band round his bat, saying "Captain Rock is still alive." They demanded fire-arms at two of those houses, and ordered them, under pain of destruction to themselves and families, not to charge their workmen more than five guineas an acre for the first crop of potatoes, and 3/. for the second crop .--On retiring they took off the farmer's horses, which were found next morning on the road to Doneraile, near Ballyhoura mountain, from which circumstance it is conjectured they came from the County Cork. In their return they met a Steward of Mr. Hill of Doneraile, who was distraining for rent, and deprived him of his gun, which they carried away.

Nicholas Morrison, an old man, a carpenter, was killed on Monday evening, by a merchants cart laden with coals passing over his body, in Denmark-street. He was conveyed at once to the County Infirmary, but he died in an hour after. In the absence of the Mayor, Aldermen Watson and Mahony held an inquest on the body, on Monday, when a verdict of accidental death was returned. It could not be ascertained whether the driver was leading his horse when this melancholy occurrence took place—but Merchants should be particularly careful in their instructions in this respect.

On Monday night the 22d inst. a man named Benjamin Reardon, of Roughal, in the county of Kerry, near Newmarket, returning from the fair of Dromagh in the County of Cork, was so severely beaten in his endeavours to protect a female from violation, that he only survived four days.
