Some parts of this County, it is to be regretted, are again exhibiting symptoms of disturbance.

On Sunday night an attempt was made to burn two farm houses, the property of Lord Stradbroke, on the lands of Bilton, but by the exertion of a few of the inhabitants and the Police, the flames were extinguished.

Last week, a daring attempt was made to assassinate the Rev. S. Grady, of Elton, near Bruff, while travelling in his carriage to attend the funeral of Mrs. Harrison, of Castle-Harrison. This gentleman was fired at on the road, but fortunately escaped the fatal shot.

On Wednesday night, two horses belonging to a tenant of Dr. Herding, on his property at Carlish, near Pallis Green, were brutally houghed by some malicious savages. The man had of late become a Corn Factor, and attributes this cruel injury to no other cause.

About the same time last year, an outrage of this kind was committed under precisely similar circumstances, the countryman having rendered himself obnoxious, by presuming to come into town with corn and selling to the merchant without employing the agency of sky-farmers.

Within those few nights past, six or seven houses have been attacked in the vicinity of Adare, at Bargalick and Finniterstown, by armed parties. One man of the name of McCarthy, a driver, was forced outside his door, on Friday night, placed on his knees and fired at; a pistol shot went through his arm and he dropped. The villains thinking him dead, retired.

In consequence of those incipient outrages, the Police in the several infected districts especially have received particular orders from their Chief Magistrate, Thomas P. Vokes, Esq. to maintain constant patrols moving during the entire night, in order to check, if possible, in the bud, the evil, before it may extend.

On Tuesday, a servant boy of the Rev. Mr. Fitzgerald P. P. of Newcastle, in this County, was apprehended in Listowel, while attempting to elope from his master with £10s. in money, which he had received on his master's account at Castle-Island.—He was committed to Bridewell.

A man of the name of Patrick Sheahan has been apprehended for the murder of John Neligan, near Listowel; he is now in the bridewell of that town, and will be tried for the crime at the next Assizes of Tralee.

No clue, unfortunately, has yet been found to lead to the discovery and apprehension of the murderers of Charles Robertson, gardener to Sir Aubrey Hunt, Bart. as stated in our last. The Magistrates, and Police under Chief Constable Smith, of Rathkeale, are indefatigable in their pursuit, but it has not as yet been attended with any probability of success.

Several ridges of Potatoes were maliciously dug up last night, at Courtbrack, near this City.

Some stacks of Corn were burned in the neighbourhood of Roscrea, last week, it is reported maliciously.

The High Sheriff of the County Cork has received a respite for all the persons left under sentence of death at last Assizes.
