An outrage of a daring nature was committed, on Monday night, at Creaghcorah, in the Liberties, by a party of four armed ruffians, who attacked the house of Martin Hayes, a Steward of the Rev. Joseph Jones, of Rathkeale, who had a few days before taken possession of the lands of Ashfort, in that quarter.—Unable to break in the door, they forced an entrance thro' a window, while one remained on guard outside. In the interval, the object of their pursuit most fortunately escaped into a loft, by the help of a ladder, which he drew up after him, and thus avoided their vengeance; disappointed in seizing Hayes, and unable to mount the loft, they fired two shots through the aperture over head happily without injuring the man. They forced his wife, a few days only after her lying-in, out of her bed, put her on her knees, and presenting their arms, ordered them to quit the house before Friday, or that her husband should have his coffin prepared against their next visit. They also said he was a spy, and coming to inform in that part of the country.—The fellows who entered were armed with a blunderbuss, pistol, and bayonet. Hayes has since got the protection of the Police, in expectation of the threatened visit.

A very melancholy occurrence took place this week, which has occasioned real concern to the numerous friends of Mr. James Cleary, a respectable and wealthy resident of Kilmallock. This Gentleman was discovered yesterday morning, lying dead on the bridge of Kilfinnan, with his brains dashed out and other marks of violence on his person. It was first apprehended that he fell a victim to the ill-fated spirit of disturbance again evincing itself in the County, but on a minute investigation of all the circumstances and with the aid of surgical advice, it was ascertained that he was by some accident thrown from a vicious mule he was riding, and kicked repeatedly by the animal until deprived of life.

The Magistrates of Cashel are engaged in the investigation of a desperate and fatal affray at Lowesgreen, on Thursday. Mr. Cuthbert, agent to Mr. Newenham, had distrained the tenantry in the neighbourhood of Lowesgreen, on the lands of Rathmacarthy, and placed keepers on the corn and potatoes. They were attacked by a multitude of country people with scythes and pitchforks, and beaten with such barbarous fury, that the lives of three are almost despaired of in Cashel Infirmary; and another, named Hayes, was killed on the spot, his head having been divided for nearly six inches. The others fortunately escaped the vengeance of the assailants by a precipitate retreat. Mr. Cuthbert himself had a wonderful escape, and obtained protection in the Police Barrack.

On Monday morning a fine boy of about seven years of age, son of a man named Kirby, was so dreadfully burned at Castle-Connell, that he is not expected to recover. The little creature was standing near the fire place, and his clothes having caught the flames it had not the power to extinguish them, and every article was burned on the body before assistance was afforded.

The market in Mary-street was broken into on Saturday night and several joints of meat stolen thereout.

On Friday, two farm houses, between Farrihy and Kildorrery, were attacked by an armed party, who robbed the inmates of 7*l.*, and inflicted several bayonet wounds on a person who offered resistance.
