

NEWCASTLE RACE COURSE.

Five horses started on Saturday for the Handicap of 10l. each, with 50l. added by the Hon. Colonel Fitzgibbon, M. P. Mr. Pennefather's Tit was the winner, after a very handsome and well contested race.

A vast assemblage of persons collected at the race-ground on Monday, amounting to many thousands of both sexes, and the weather, notwithstanding some unfavourable symptoms, held fair during the day. The Course was decorated with elegant equipages, presenting a brilliant array of fashion and beauty, which lined the interval at each side, from the distance to the winning post, in one splendid and unvaried succession. Sweepstakes of 5l. each, to which the Stewards added 50l., weight for age. There were three very famous heats.

The horses appeared well matched, and shewed very excellent running; kept well together, until nearing the winning-post, when both shewed fine play. The running afforded general satisfaction. Betting was pretty even.

Admirable running was exhibited during this match, and the three heats afforded a more beautiful specimen of skill and power than was witnessed since the meeting commenced. The day's sport afforded universal pleasure.

A very handsome saddle race was run on Sunday, by Mr. Hannan's and Mr. Green's horses. In consequence of some mistake there were four heats, and the former horse won.

Attempts were made on Monday, at various intervals, to disturb the order of the meeting, by rising a general fight, but they were quickly put down by the energy and vigor of the Police and Military, who seized several sticks from the most active among the Country fellows.

Another match is made for this day, but not under the direction of the Stewards, as the regular stakes are all disposed of.

A poor woman, named Jane Ward, whose intellects were supposed to be deranged, was rode over at the Race Course, yesterday, and killed on the spot. The Mayor has since held an inquest on the body.

The Stewards intend erecting a magnificent Stand-house at Newcastle Race-Course, for all ensuing meetings.
