Yesterday morning, a man was found lying on the road between Crough and Rathkeale in this County, in a dying state, being wounded in the head by a shot. When first discovered he could speak a little, said his name was M'Carthy, from Kerry; he was removed to Rathkeale, where he died this morning—no trace has as yet been discovered of the Perpetrators of this inhuman murder, nor any cause assigned, as he was apparently a poor creature, without shoes or stockings.

There was a violent affray between two factions at Mil-town-Malbay, on Sunday, immediately after both leaving Chapel, when scythes, sticks, and stones were used by the combatants in the most reckless manner. One gentleman who happened to be a spectator, received a blow of a stone which would have proved very serious but for the timely medical assistance he received.

Wednesday, the City Police apprehended at Cratloe, Richard Jones, a corn broker, charged with being of the party who murdered M'Mahon, at the Mayor's Stone. It will be recollected that Bradley and M'Inerney were capitally convicted, but subsequently transported for this crime.

A warrant was received on Thursday from Drogheda, at our City Police Office, to apprehend Martin Daly, a pensioner, of the 27th Regiment, who was suspected to have been in Limerick; and who is charged with absconding with £20, the property of H. Chester, Esq. of Drogheda. He was yesterday morning arrested by Serjeant Sparling, when applying for his pension, which he expected through our Post-Office.

At four o'clock yesterday evening, the extensive brewery concerns of Greer & Murphy, Clonmel, were discovered on fire, and were burning with dreadful fury up to 6 o'clock, when the entire premises occupying a space of 200 feet by 500, presented one solid mass of flames. Property to the amount of 15,000*l*. has been destroyed, and the concerns were insured for 10,000*l* with the Patriotic and Westminster Insurance Companies.
