General Douglas, First Colonel Commandant of the

Mr Hudson Lowe, K. C. B. has resigned his appoint-
ment as Lieutenant-Governor and second in command of
forces at Ceylon. The local rank of Lieutenant-
General on the Continent of Europe only, has since been
conferred on him. Sir Hudson now resides at Versailles,
in great privacy. Fears were entertained that he might
be liable to insult from the half-pay French officers, and
strict orders have been given to the Police to guard against
such.
It will be seen by a reference to the India despatches,
that Brigadier-General Willoughby Cotton bears most
creditable testimony to the alacrity, zeal and gallantry of
the following Officers, among others in the recent opera-
tions:—Lieut.-Colonel O'Donoghue, Major Sadler,
and Captain Wainwright, of his Majesty's 47th Regt.;
Brigadier Mallet, Major Basden, and Captain Young,
of his Majesty's 89th Regt.; Captains Rose and Cannon,
of the same gallant corps, fell in the act of leading on,
with the greatest intrepidity, a strong party of 200 men,
to a formidable position in front of Donabew. The
Officers of the 89th, wounded, are Lieutenants W. J.
King, C. G. King, and J. Currie, and 52 rank and
file. Lieut. Wilson, of his Majesty's 13th Light Infan-
try, one of the General's staff, is much praised.
The name of the Vandeleur Cruizer has been altered to
that of Hornet.
The Archbishop of Cashel, and the Lord Bishop of
Killaloe, have arrived in Dublin.
On Sunday, the Bishop of Ferns held an ordination in
St. Mark's Church, Dublin; his son read morning ser-
vice, and Sir F. L. Blossie, Bart. preached on the occa-
sion.
The Lord Bishop of Killaloe has presented the Rev.
Allen Morgan, Chaplain of the King's Hospital, and
Domestic Chaplain to the most Noble the Marquis of
Castings, to the united Vicarages of Kileenry, Tomfin-
nigh, and Clonloghan, in the Diocese of Killaloe, vacant
by the death of the Rev. Fitzwilliam Miller.
The Lord Bishop of Limerick has left Dublin for the
seat of his brother, Justice Jebb, in the County Wicklow.
A young girl was shockingly burned in the face, hands,
arms, and neck, on Friday, in the Abbey, in the absence
of her worse than negligent parents, who locked her up
with another child, careless of the consequences. The
clothes of the little victim caught fire in the grate, and
she was soon in a blaze; but the courage and presence
of mind of a sister, not much older than herself, averted
the impending danger, by dragging her towards a tub of
water, into which she with difficulty threw her, and the
flames were extinguished. She has been admitted to the
County Infirmary much disfigured.
On Saturday, a melancholy accident happened at Kil-
more, County Clare, the seat of Poole Hickman, Esq.
originating in the negligence of servants. The house
maid was bringing fire up stairs to one of the rooms, when
the blaze kindled, and she very imprudently attempted to
smother it with her apron, when the flames instantly com-
municated to all her clothes, attacked her person, and
burned her dreadfully that she died in a short time after.
