Sir Edward O'Brien, Bart. M. P. arrived in town
yesterday, from Dublin, and shortly after left town for
his seat Dromoland.

Arrived in Cove harbour, on yesterday se'nnight, after
a passage of thirty days from the city of St. John, New
Brunswick, the ship *Agamemnon*; during her passage she
encountered tremendous and continued gales, which did

of the Press. On Saturday last he arrived in this city, in
time to receive the warm congratulations of numerous
friends; and on Sunday evening, at the hour of 6 o'clock,
he preached an appropriate missionary sermon to a large
and respectable audience, in the beautiful house of worship
which he had opened in this city before his departure,
when a liberal collection evinced the satisfaction of the
congregation at his return to his native country—and on
yesterday morning, he proceeded on his way to Dublin.

Within the last five weeks, upwards of seven hundred
puncheons of Whiskey have been imported into Belfast
alone from Scotland.

The Kilmallock cup was run for on Wednesday last,
and from the fineness of the day great amusement was
expected, but was won in a canter by Mr. Doonan's
Paddy from Cork, rode by Mr. M'Donogh. *Paddy from
Cork* is thought to be the best steeple-chase horse in
Ireland, and would be matched against any horse, five
miles on a sporting country for any amount.

The Bruff Winter Fair, generally considered one of
the largest for the season, was held on Monday; it was
most numerously attended by purchasers and sellers; the
shew of stock was considerable, and a vast portion of bus-
ness done. As no other Fair of any consequence is to
follow but that of Tipperary, on the 10th of December,
and the Graziers being satisfied, with the prices that were
offered, bargains were made to a large amount in the early
part of the day. For Cork there were about 500 head
bought, intended for slaughter; they consisted almost
entirely of Cows, and sold from £10 to 14*l.* according to
quality. One lot of Bullocks, 25, went to 18*l.* 15*s.* there
were also 120 Cows bought for market at the same ave-
rage. It would appear from our respectable informant
that these prices have not been under those obtained at
any of the preceding Fairs, that the business of the day
was transacted with great rapidity.
