The great Fife case is brought to a close, the Scottish Court of Session having decided that the deed of entail and trust deed, which excluded the present Earl of Fife from a considerable part of his estates, amounting to the sum of £20,000 annually, and accumulated rents since 1808, were not the deeds of the grantee, the late Earl.

The Earl of Charlemont, Lady Molyneux, and the Hon. Mrs. Caulfield, have been elected honorary members.

Two hundred children of the Primates school in Armagh, were supplied with a plentiful dinner on Christmas day, by the benevolent Lady Anne Beresford.

The Hon. and Rev. B. Howard, has given 10l. for the relief of sick and indigent room-keepers, and 10l. for the Meath Hospital.

Richard P. O'Shoe, of Gardenmorris, Esq. presided at the Waterford Catholic meeting on Wednesday, when it was resolved to petition for unqualified emancipation, and to support the liberal Candidate for the County. A vote of thanks was passed to Mr. O'Connell.

At a meeting of the Leitrim Catholics, on Thursday, R. M'Namara, of Letterfine, Esq. in the Chair, it was resolved to apply to Parliament for a repeal of the Penal Laws, and that their petition should be presented by the Earl of Kingston in the Lords, and Mr. S. Rice, M. P. in the Commons.

On Thursday night last, some wicked incendiary placed fire in three different parts of the house of a poor industrious weaver in Bandon, which would in all probability have been consumed, with his wife and four children, were it not that the wife was awoken by the suffocating smell, before the fire had extended. A short time ago some miscreants threw Oil of Vitriol on his warp, and burned his piece through, and all this it is supposed because he would not submit to the rules of the Committee.

At the Commission on Tuesday, Judge Moore, directed the acquittal of Edward Carroll, charged with having base coin and forged notes in his possession, against whom the only evidence was an expression unwarily dropped at the time of his arrest.—The learned Judge censured such an attempt at prosecution. Catherine Brady was acquitted of receiving a stolen 100l. note of the Bank of Ireland, from insufficiency of evidence. Michael Fitzharris, for the murder of a person unknown, was also acquitted—and John Donnelly and his wife, for having in their possession 120 counterfeit shillings, were convicted.

A duel took place yesterday morning, near Sandymount, between Mr. W. G. ———, and Mr. P. G. ———, when the ball of the former Gentleman passed through the side of the latter; and from the opinion of the surgeon who attended and extracted the ball, we are led to fear that it is of a dangerous nature. The dispute, we are told, occurred concerning a political subject.

Yesterday evening, in consequence of information obtained at Henry-street Police-office, that two Gentlemen, Messrs. Cox and Perrott, of this City, intended to have a hostile meeting this morning the former Gentleman and his friend, Mr. Bartlett, were arrested, and bound over to the peace.

An inquest was held yesterday by Alexander Montgomery, Esq. Coroner, on the body of D. Dickenson, Capt. of the Isabella, who fell into the Liffey at the North-wall the evening before. Verdict—Found drowned.

On Christmas day, a man of the name of Clifford was killed at Ballycastle, by a policeman named Blair, with his party strove to put down a desperate riot between two factions, in which the deceased was an active party.

Upwards of one hundred cases were yesterday decided by the Mayor, arising out of the confusion which exists regarding the change of currency; and all of them the Mayor directed that 13s. of the old copper coin should be allowed for the British mulling. In the case of Pawn-brokers who demanded payment in British money on all articles deposited with them before the 5th of January, The Chief Magistrate, in every instance, particularly ordered that Irish currency only should be taken by them, in which money they originally advanced themselves to the borrowers. The same rule applies clearly to all debts contracted before the 5th January. We have heard, however, that in some public Coals Establishments, the charge for seats originally in Irish money has been now demanded in British.—This is clearly bordering on imposition.

At nine o'clock, yesterday morning, an inquisition was held by the Mayor of Limerick, at the Infirmary, on the body of Michael Fitz-Gibbon, of Curragh Bridge, whose skull was fractured on St. Stephen's day, by a party of ruffians who way-laid him on his return home from Adare. After the examination of several witnesses, which occupied some hours, the Jury returned a verdict of wilful murder against the perpetrators, who are all known, and for whose apprehension the Mayor has issued his warrant.

The Post Boy, conveying the Mail from Tyrell's Pass to Philipstown, was stopped on the morning of the 29th ult. by a man armed, who robbed him of the Mail Bag, threatening his life if he resisted.

Edward Carroll, charged with the murder of Martin Kenny, near Birr, was apprehended by a party of the Galway Constabulary, at the County Court, on the 29th ult. in the house of his sister, concealed under a bed, in which lay his sister and two other females. He was escorted to Birr, and lodged in the gaol of that town.

On Saturday, about 300 fellows with sticks, approached Newcastle, and took up a position close to that town, for the purpose of fighting another party, in which they had been disappointed, on Stephen's day, by the activity of the Military and Police. Their intention soon became known, and Alfred and Thomas Furlong, Esqrs. Rev. E. Geratty, and Major Sullivan, having completed the necessary arrangements in case these disturbers attempted to enter the town, proceeded with a strong force of Military under Major Fleming, 22d Regiment, and Police under Lieutenant Percy, to expel the intruders. The fact which had by this time much increased in numbers, on observing the approach of such a strong force, deliberately retired from the position, and dispersed in a few moments, without coming in collision with the power of the law, intimating that they had given the other faction an opportunity of fighting, if they had the spirit to meet them.

There was a desperate battle near Broadford, in this County on Stephen's day, between two parties called the Noans and the Murphys, and, on Sunday, the army and Police found it necessary to attend there, to prevent Newcastle, Dromcolliher, and Glanduff, to disperse those unruly violators of the peace, who drew up their respective fans in great force.

Two first cousins of the name of Tobin, died on Tuesday, of blows received from stones thrown by rioters at the last fair of Golden.

Doctor Egle, Surgeon to the Forces at Clonmel, has been ordered to Athlone district.

The 1st Royals are at Fermoy, in hourly expectation of the transports, on whose arrival they will move from Cork.

The 1st Battalion 60th Foot will complete its march from Wexon to Manchester, this day.

The 51st Foot, have marched from Portsmouth to Gosport; 74th Foot from Glasgow to Striding; 77th Foot from Glasgow to Paisley; 80th Foot from Manchester to the Isle of Man; 91st Foot from Edinburgh to Perth; 95th Foot from Manchester to Burnley; 99th Foot from Manchester to Stockport.

We regret to have to announce the death of Major Carthew, of the 39th Regiment, who particularly distinguished himself in suppressing the recent disturbances which prevailed in the County Cork. He was with his regiment at Chatham, preparing to embark for New South Wales, and expired after only two days illness.

Major Fogarty and officers of the 33d, at Glasgow, gave a plentiful dinner on Christmas Day to the soldiers of that regiment, consisting of roast beef, plum-pudding and a pint of porter each man.
