Last night, the house of a farmer named Houragan, at
Ankey, within five miles of this City, was broken into
by four men, who beat and robbed him of 12*l.* in money,
which he had received in the Limerick market during the
day for pigs; and he suspects that those persons saw him
with the money, as four men answering the description of
the robbers, had been seen passing Anzacotty Bridge,
about six in the evening.

We mentioned in our last, the particulars which led to
the death of a man named William Bourke, at Oulla, in
this County. The Bench of Magistrates at the General
Quarter Sessions, on Monday, having learned that the
unfortunate man had been buried without any inquest
being sat on his body, or any enquiry into the cause that
led to his death, directed that James Bennett, Esq. Coroner
and Surgeon Franklin, jun. should proceed forthwith to
a church-yard of Shronon, in the County of Tipperary,
where they had the body disinterred, and on yesterday the
Coroner, assisted by Captain Thos. Lloyd, John Dawson
White and Morgan O'Dwyer Esq. held an inquest on the
body of said Bourke and a very intelligent Jury, returned
the verdict—"That said Bourke was killed from a gun-shot
wound received from Constable William Tasey"—against
whom a warrant was immediately issued.
