ANOTHER ACCOUNT.

(From a Correspondent.)

" "On Wednesday night, about eight o'clock, as Serjeant Holland, of the 62d Regiment, for some time on the recruiting service, in Newcastle, was walking outside the town on the road leading from the rere of the barrack, he was fired at by some person unknown, and his left arm so desperately lascerated that the flesh was literally torn from the bone. On his arrival in town and the transaction being made known, Major Fleming, of the 22d Regt. instantly sallied forth with a guard of his men, having arst ordered the wounded man to the military hospital; on the Major's arrival at the spot where the shot was fired, quantity of blood and part of the Serjeant's coat were discovered on the road, and within a few yards a horseistol was found, which, it appeared, was the one out of thich the shot was fired. Such an outrage very natually excited a general feeling among the inhabitants of be town-the Magistrates and Police made every exeron to discover the perpetrator of such a diabolical acthe Serjeant declared he did not know any of the three ersons whom he said he saw at the time; however, on a eview of the pistol, it was identified by a soldier of the 2d Regiment, who saw it in the hand of a young recruit its are longing to Serjeant Holland, the day before—on which was traced to the original owner, who sold the pistol to the recruit, whose name is Richard Plummer, and who has been taken into custody by the Magistrates and Police, Gos- his being questioned, he said he gave the pistol the day fore to another person, and totally disclaimed any howledge of the transaction.

" Serjeant Major Davis, lately of the 39th Regiment, seting deputy barrack-master in Newcastle, having remired to the place where the recruit was confined, and on entering into a close investigation, he observed a spot of blood on his waistcoat, and also perceived the fingers of his right hand bruised and disfigured as from the explosion of an overloaded gun or pistol; the Serjeant Major perceiving the recruit to change countenance (particularly when he told him the pistol was found, and that he, the Sergeant Major, knew the whole transaction) on which the recruit instantly unravelled the mystery to Mr. Davis, which, it is probable, would have remained for ever in darkness, and thereby reflect an indelible stain on the character of the inhabitants of Newcastle. " As Sir Chas. Doyle, the General of the district, has

arrived in Newcastle, for the purpose of investigating the transmition, it is not necessary to give any further detail at the present; it is sufficient to say, that the Recruiting Serjeaut, and his colleague the Recruit, had formed a plan for the perpetration of the horrid deed, for the sole purpose of securing a handsome pension for the Serjeant, from whom the Recruit was to get a sum of money, for his service on the occasion. It appears by the confession of the Recruit, that the pistol was overloaded with powder and balls, by the Serjeant himself, whereas at the explosion it flew out of his hand, and he could not find it in the dark."

Since the last account was received, we have seen Surreon Franklin, who has just returned after dressing Holland's wounds; and he states, that the Serjeant has sworn informations, contradictory of the recruit's allegation, and charging him with the act, and fabricating the above tory.
