lately under the command of Captain Wilkinson, at Sheer-
ness, were disbanded on the 24th ult. by Colonel Sir
Archibald Christie, the Commandant at Chatham.

The 1st Royal Veteran Company, lately under the com-
mand of Brevet Major Spinluff, was also disbanded by
Sir Archibald Christie, on the 24th ult. at Chatham.

The 3d Veteran Battalion were disbanded at Chatham
last week, and the following officers from that corps have
been removed to the line:—Captain W. Smith, to the 5th
foot; Lieut. M. T. O'Rielly, and Ensign A. Stewart, to
the 21st; Ensign E. Ross, to the 32d; Brevet-Major J.
B. Lynch, and Ensign W. Walsh, to the 35th; Lieut.
H. C. Scarman, to the 39th; Lieut. J. Crofton, to the
54th; Lieut. C. O'Beirne, to the 82d; Lieut. J. Sweeny,
to the 87th; Lieut. J. McCasland, to the 89th; Brevet-
Major W. Pilkington, to the 92d; Ensign M. Cassan,
to the 94th;—all the Commissions are ante-dated to the
7th, 8th, and 9th of April, 1825.

The Depot of the 12th Foot marched from Youghal
on the 23d ult. and arrived next day at Fermoy, leaving
a detachment of 40 rank and file at Youghal.

The Depot of the North Devon Militia has been minutely
inspected by an Officer specially deputed by the Ordnance
Department, with a view of ascertaining what articles of
clothing and other stores were necessary for another annual
training, which, it is presumed, will take place this year.

The Lords Commissioners of Chelsea Hospital have
considerately made an increase of pension to out-pensioners
totally blind—to Serjeants, 2s. a day; and to Corporals or
Privates, 1s. 9d. a day—to take effect from the 25th inst.

Alderman Watson and Sir Christopher Marrett were
occupied the greater part of Saturday last, in investigating
the cause of the disappearance of Mr. James O'Halloran,
a respectable farmer of the North Liberties, who has not
been heard of since Thursday night last; he was seen
late in the evening, in company with two unfortunate
women (who are in custody,) there is little doubt that he
has been drowned, as his cane and hat were found a consi-
derable distance down the river, on Sunday. The Magis-
trates have detained four suspicious persons, for further
examinations until the body is found.

In searching for some of the suspicious characters
connected with Mr. O'Halloran's case, on Saturday last,
a man calling himself Jeremiah Callahan, was discovered
in a miserable hovel in Old Post-Office Lane; his appear-
ance exciting suspicion, the apartment as well as his per-
son were searched, and in his pocket were found 34 gold
guineas, 6 sovereigns and 29l. national notes. As he was
known to have kept an improper house, he was detained
by the Magistrates until he could give some satisfactory
account of himself; he has undergone two examinations
before Alderman Watson, Sir C. Marrett and Alderman
Mahony, without any satisfactory information having
been obtained; he stated himself to be lately from Drum-
colloher, in this County, and to have been a farmer—he is
a tall, athletic man, about fifty years of age and unhealthy
appearance. The notes he asserted to have been in his
possession four years, but they were found to have been
made for the most part in 1824 and 1825.

On Saturday night last, a bacon shop, in Mungret-
street, was robbed, and several pieces of meat found scat-
tered about the street in the morning.

On Sunday evening, an elderly man named Richard
Brown, fell into the Shannon, at O'Brien's-Bridge, and
unfortunately perished.

Cornelius Nolan, a farmer, living at Mount Pleasant,
near Askeaton, was attacked on his return from Lime-
rick, on Thursday evening, by three fellows, who drag-
ged him off his horse, near Tervoe. One of the party
struck him a blow of a heavy stone which fractured
his head, and inflicted other wounds on his person.—
They attempted to rob him, and carry off his watch, to
which he made every resistance, and fearing the approach
of the Police, whom his cries had alarmed, the wretches
fled without effecting their purpose. The unfortunate
man continues under the care of Surgeon Franklin, who
entertains hopes of his recovery.

On Wednesday night, three sheep, the property of Mr.
Quinlan, were maliciously killed on the lands of Minnus-
town, County Tipperary and their carcasses taken away.

A watchman was stabbed in Ennis, on Saturday-night,
in a reconre with four soldiers of the 84th Regt. from
Clare Castle.

All the bodies of the persons drowned last week on the
lake of Dromore, have been found by their afflicted rela-
tives. The burial scene was one of the most affecting
witnessed for a long time. The servant man has left a
wife, and six young daughters,

On Monday the 30th ult. Mr. Evans's fox hounds
drew Barna Goss cover near Milltown Castle. The

Castletown Conyers, he then made for Ballingarry, and
skirting Knockflorina, he directed his course to Newcas-
tle; however he was headed again at Coolruss, and here
the hounds were snapping at him, but he beat them a long
the flats to Faha, and would have earthed, for the in-
tervention of one of Mr. Tuthill's buck hounds which
prevented him. Reynard was now greatly harrassed and
the wind favouring him, he made for the County of Cork,
and touching on Castle Dodd, he took to the mountains,
and tried the earth at Ballyhea, and held on to Castle
Oliver, where the hounds came up with him, and devour-
ed him in a most sporting manner! Of the nume-
rous field, only two gentleman rode in with the hounds,
namely Mr. Doolin, of Bruff, on Paddy from Cork and
Mr. Michael Nunan, on his famous horse Priest.

A steeple-chase of four miles was run near Kinsale, on
Monday, by three horses belonging to Mr. W. Bullen,
Mr. James Holmes and Mr. W. Baxter, which were rode
by the owners. After a hard contest, Mr. Bullen's horse,
Ginger, won in admirable style, having covered the ground
in twenty-one minutes.

Theatricals are now performing in the barracks of
Cork by the Military. Lieut. Colonel Milne and the
Officers have not discouraged this innocent amusement.

The experiment for introducing the Cotton Manufac-
ture into Waterford, is succeeding most satisfactorily.—
Commenced only within the last six months, fifty persons
are constantly employed at it.

It is rumoured that all the Custom Revenue Officers
lately interchanged between Ireland and England, will
be ordered back to their original places forthwith, and
that a Treasury Minute to that effect has been made out
for transmission to the respective officers.

On Monday evening, it commenced blowing a very
heavy gale from the North West, approaching at intervals
to the fury of a hurricane, and continued to a late hour
the same night. The tide (the first of the Springs,) rose
so high as to cover a great part of the Custom House
Quay, and Long Dock. A large turf boat was stranded
at Meade's Quay, and all the loading irretrievably lost.—
The vessels in harbour received no material injury.

Two large lighters, laden with turf for the Distillery,
were overtaken by the storm near the Salmon-Weir, and
narrowly escaped swamping, with the loss of their
cargo.

A large sail boat deeply laden with turf, coming up
the river, was seen to founder near Tarbert, and all hands
perished.

Another turf boat was lost near Glin, and two brothers
named Kelly perished in her.

Cork was visited with a very severe gale the entire of
Monday—some of the squalls were extremely violent.
