

Cork Grand Jury. The Landed and Trading interests on the Cork and Limerick road, by Mallow, Buttevant, and Charleville, are to meet in Cork on the 23d inst. to petition Parliament against the renewal of the Turnpike Road Act.

Major Palmer, one of the Inspectors-General of Prisons, devoted a considerable portion of yesterday to the inspection and examination of the City Cork Jail, in its several departments. He was attended by Mr. Sheriff Spearing, and expressed every satisfaction at the state of the prison.

On Saturday night last, that valuable officer of Police, W. H. Pearse, Esq. Chief Constable at Newport, in the County of Tipperary, proceeded under the authority of a warrant from Mr. Vokes, to the lands of Annagh, in the County of Limerick, which is bounding Mr. Pearse's district, where he succeeded in apprehending John Ryan, who fled on the night of the 5th December, 1824, when Daniel Connell was murdered at Bilboa, on Lord Stradbroke's estate. Ryan is a young man over six feet high, and has a large mark of a wound on his head, which it is stated he received on the night of that horrid murder, which was perpetrated, because Connell took a farm from which another person had been lately ejected for non payment of rent.

A party of the Newport Police in crossing the river on Saturday night, had a very narrow escape; one of the men was carried away by the current, and but for the exertions of two others of the party, would inevitably have perished.

On the 15th inst. a cow, the property of Mr. G. Drew, of Ballyket, near Kilrush, was barbarously loughed by some malicious wretches, and her tail cut off.

An inquest having been held on the body of Bridget Brown, the innocent and unfortunate victim of the late most savage and revolting act of barbarity, near Tulla, a verdict of "wilful murder," was returned against Connor Reddan and Lucius Welsh, principals in this inhuman outrage. It would appear that the poor woman was absolutely burned to death by those horrid wretches, in their cursed passion for money.—"Auri sacra fumes, quid non mortalia pectora cogit."

In a scandalous affray between some butchers and country people in the cattle market of Cork, on Monday, a poor woman received a blow of a stone, which fractured her skull, and she died in a very short time.

Yesterday Daniel Collins was lodged by the Mayor in jail, there to remain one month, for vending spirituous liquors without license.

A Physician and Treasurer are to be elected to the Ballinacorney Dispensary, County Cork, on the 14th inst.

An extraordinary Physician is to be elected to the same, never to resign, on the 20th of March.

At an adjourned meeting of the Governors of the House of Industry, in Cork, on Monday, it was agreed that the Board should assemble on Monday next, for the election of officers to that Institution. A Physician and a moral Governor are to be appointed at salaries of 150l. each.

The new Kerry Coach Company are about to run a second Coach on the Macroom line of road.

There is not, at this moment, a single case of fever, in the town of Carrick-on-Shannon.

The name of the servant who was convicted on Thursday last, before Sir C. Marrett and Captain Drought, for repeatedly absenting himself from his master's employment, is John Toomy.

To the Editor of the Limerick Chronicle.

Sir—We beg, through the medium of your columns, to return our most grateful thanks to G. Drought, Esq. Chief Magistrate of the City Limerick Police, for his extraordinary exertions and success in the discovery of our property, consisting of £51 in Bank Notes, &c. embezzled by Michael Ryan, carrier, to whom we entrusted it to purchase goods in Limerick. It was a case of a most singular nature, having no clue whatever that might lead to a discovery, but from the story told by Ryan, who alleged he had been robbed. Some suspicion having rested on his brother-in-law, Patrick Kennelly, who lived at Annescotty, we procured a search warrant, which Captain Drought sent by his very efficient Police, who, having made a most diligent search, found a piece of new cloth, and, not thinking the account given of when or where it was purchased, true, very judiciously brought it to Limerick, and having gone to several shops a length found that it had been purchased by Kennelly, and a £3 note of our property given in payment. In the mean time, the Police secured Kennelly, who, when found in a public-house, who, after a great many and very circumstantial questions by Captain Drought, confessed the entire; Captain Drought immediately dispatched a party of his Police, with Kennelly disguised in Police uniform, to Annescotty, where the greater part of the money was found concealed in the thatch of a house. We feel it our imperative duty to give this affair publicity, as had it not been for Captain Drought and his Police's zeal and activity on this occasion, there was little probability of succeeding in the discovery, to whom too much praise cannot be given.
