WEDNESDAY, MARCH 1.

On Friday night last, the house of Thomas O'Donovan, in this County, was entered by a party of ruffians, who forcibly took away his daughter, a child thirteen years of age.—Early the following morning offenders were closely pursued by Constable I. and Sub-Constable Michael Thornell, of Captain's party of Police, stationed at Bruff, who, after search and active pursuit, succeeded in rescuing the cent victim from the hands of those marauders, and bringing her to her parents; but, we regret to state, the perpetrators of this horrible and wanton act have yet been apprehended.

On the night of Wednesday, the 22d ult. a party was made to Serjeant Cranwell of the Police station, Killinan, under the command of Benjamin L. Esq. that a body of about twenty fellows had gathered close to the town, after breaking the door of a public house in that neighbourhood, with stones, and had proceeded to the mountains of Ballintubber. Serjeant Cranwell with his party immediately went in pursuit, and after traversing the mountains for several hours, came upon them as they were in the act of forcibly carrying off the daughter of a farmer residing in Glenroe. They were challenged and were fired on by the country fellows, who instantly returned the fire, which put them to flight, and all escaped in consequence of being mounted, but the Police succeeded in rescuing the girl and bringing her safe into Killinan, together with three horses, one of which had a gun-shot wound in the breast. Serjeant Cranwell and his party, which consisted of only five men, deserve every praise for their exertions and steadiness on this occasion.

The house and offices of Patrick Egan, residing in the Lands of Lisduff, County Clare, were entirely consumed by incendiaries on Sunday night, together with a horse and cow, and large quantity of corn, his property. The burning was clearly malicious, and the reason assigned is his having taken some land out of lease.

Monday, a division of the 63d, under Captain Egan, arrived here from Westport, and yesterday the head-quarters division of the same Regiment, commanded by Major Fairtlough, arrived from Castlebar, and this morning continued their route for Buttevant.

We regret to hear, that the 4th Dragoon Guards, under Major Chatterton, quartered in this garrison, are to be sent for Dublin, on the route to England, on the 11th inst.

The unsuccessful Candidates were Doctors O'Keefe, Warren, Evanson, Moriarty, Bull, and Sharkey. The election of a Moral Governor is postponed to Thursday week.

Mr. Townsend is about to commence a course of lectures on elocution, at the Cork Institution.

The library of the Mechanics' Institute was opened to its members on Monday, the room is very spacious, and the arrangements got up in a manner perfectly accommodating to the numerous subscribers.

The Committee of Merchants in Cork, are to appoint a Butter Inspector, on Friday.

Two Spirit Retailers were this day fined in penalties of £5 each, for vending spirituous liquors, on Sunday last.

At the Fair of Patrick's-Well and Ballyhanrahan, on Monday, there was a very fine show of Cattle of all descriptions, which went off quickly at low prices; almost all the horses and pigs that appeared at the Fair were bought up.

An annual saving of £500 a-year has been effected in the Eunis Fever Hospital, by the excellent management of Doctor W. A. McDonough, to whom the Committee have passed a vote of thanks.
