DEATHS.

Yesterday, at Corbally, after a very few days illness, sincerely lamented by his numerous and respectable friends Sir Christopher A. Marrett, Alderman and Charter Justice of this City, a Magistrate of the Counties of Limerick and Tipperary, and Captain of the Limerick Yeomanry Corps. The premature death of this highly esteemed gentleman, has inflicted a wound on the feelings of his young and amiable family, too deep and sincere not to be permanent, while in the public mind it has excited a strong and general expression of unaffected regret. When Mayor of this City in 1821, he was deputed by his fellow-citizens to present an address to his Majesty, on his arrival in this Country, and on that occasion received the honor of Knighthood, from the hands of his Sovereign in Dublin-Castle. His character as a Magistrate was unexceptionable for impartiality, intelligence and firmness, in social life his deportment was marked by manners the most affable and engaging, while in the domestic circle he was ever the most tender and affectionate of parents. Those only who were most intimately acquainted with him, and they perhaps are few, can adequately appreciate the sterling worth of his character. His remains are to be interred in the family vault at St. Munchin's, to-morrow.
