Marrett, Alderman and Charter Justice of this City, a Magistrate of the Counties of Lines 1 - 1 Grant Capanion the Limerick Yeomanry Corps. The premature death of this highly esteemed gentleman, has inflicted a wound on the feelings of his young and amiable family, too deep and sincere not to be permanent, while in the public mind it has excited a strong and general expression of unaffected regret. When Mayor of this City in 1821, he was deputed by his fellow-citizens to present an address to his Majesty, on his arrival in this Country, and on that occasion received the honor of Knighthood, from the hands of his Sovereign in Dublin-Castle.
