

THE CASE OF CAPTAIN KENDAL.

The humane attentions paid by Lord Byron and his friends to Captain Kendal and the few who survived the mutiny we recited some days since, induced the Mayor of this City to express, in a letter to Lord Byron, obligations felt by himself and the Citizens of Limerick to Captain Kendal being a native of this City, to his Lordship and the gallant crew who distinguished themselves on that trying occasion. To this communication his Lordship has returned the following reply—it does full credit to the benevolence of his Lordship's heart:—

Portsmouth, March 30, 1826.

Sir,—I have just had the honor and pleasure of receiving your letter of the 21st of March; the sentiments expressed in that letter are highly gratifying to me, the officers, and ship's company of his Majesty's ship Blonde, and though we did but that which any other officers would gladly have done, yet we cannot but feel a gratification at being the means (under Almighty Providence) of preserving a fellow-creature from a premature grave, whose sufferings have been unparalleled, except from me, Sir, from the officers, and ship's company of his Majesty's ship Blonde, our sincere thanks for the honor you have done us as Mayor of the City of Limerick, and allow me to subscribe myself,
