COURT OF EXCHEQUER APRIL 28.

In this case, which was tried at the last Assizes of Limerick, and a verdict had for the Defendant, a conditional order to set aside that verdict was had on the part of the Plaintiffs early in the Term; and this day the Defendant shewed cause against it effectually, thereby establishing the verdict, and for ever setting at rest the alleged claims of the Lessors of the Plaintiffs. Mr. Serjeant Goold sought to establish the conditional order, which was ably resisted by Mr. Pennefather in a most luminous speech and concise argument.

COURT OF KING'S BENCH.

CRIMINAL INFORMATION.

The Mayor of Waterford v. Phillip Barron, Esq. & another.

Mr. Doherty applied to the Court for a conditional order for a criminal information for a libel, against Philip Barron, of William-street, City of Waterford, Esq. as proprietor of The Waterford Chronicle; and also for a similar one against Benjamin Perrin, the printer of that newspaper. The motion was grounded on the affidavit of John Snow, Esq. which stated that a libellous publication, animadverting on him, appeared in that Paper on the 6th of April last. It was headed "another experiment of the Beresford Faction," and that he was fully convinced it was an intention of the publisher of said Paper, thereby to vilify and defame him in his situation of Mayor of the City of Waterford, to lower him in the estimation of his fellow-citizens, and bring him into contempt and ridicule.

Conditional Rule granted.

Private information having been given to Mr. Goodison, Chief Constable of College-street Police Office, relative to the murderers of that respected deceased Gentleman, (the Rev. Mr. Wogan,) he proceeded this morning at five o'clock to Donnybrook, accompanied by a party of his police, and succeeded in apprehending Robert Burges, Denis Hines, George Stanley, and Mary Moore, who have, after a strict examination, been fully committed to Newgate for trial.—Denis Hines, one of the fellows above named, has been fully identified by Mr. Bell, as one of the gang that robbed him of his watch and money on his return to the Rock, and which took place previous to the murder of Mr. Wogan.

In consequence of further information received yesterday, respecting the death of the Rev. Mr. Wogan, the Magistrates consider themselves warranted in detaining Patrick Kelly and his wife in custody for further examination. The Magistrates are indefatigable in their exertions to unravel this dreadful and mysterious affair.

We have seen two of the bludgeons used by the combinators in their brutal attack upon Byrne, in Stephen's-green, on Friday last. They are short, wedge-made, and of ash, admirably calculated for effecting the work of destruction, and weigh one, two pounds, the other, one and three quarters. These murderous instruments are adorned with appropriate mottoes, "Colts beware," &c. &c. painted in well executed characters. Heavens, to what a state of barbarity are we reduced! Can it be possible that the Government will continue to regard such proceeding, and such preparations with supineness?

The unfortunate sawyer, named Byrne, who was so inhumanly beaten, a few days since, remains in a very dangerous condition, nor can he, for some days to come, be pronounced out of danger.

A man named Scully was killed by the fall of a tree in Booterstown parish. He has left a widow and children in extreme distress.

Dysentery, typhus fever, and poverty, prevail to a great extent at Drogheda.

Six human beings have perished, within the last week, at Clonakilty, absolutely of starvation.

The new copper coin is now issuing from the Custom House of Newry.

Colonel Travers presided, at Clonakilty, on Tuesday

Yesterday, the troops in garrison under command of Major-General Sir Charles Doyle, consisting of the Royal Artillery, (Colonel Worsley,) 3d Dragoon Regiment, (Captain Maunsell,) 24th Regiment, (Colonel Fildes,) and 84th Regiment, (Colonel Maitland,) marched from Newcastle, for the purpose of going thro' all the manoeuvres of a sham fight; the spectators were not numerous, the day proved unfavourable to the exhibition. The troops were supported by a party of Artillery and Cavalry, who opposed to the 84th, and after some skirmishing the troops of the former were driven in. Several charges of Cavalry followed, and were sustained in brilliant manner by the infantry, who presented at all points an imposing front, occasionally covering the Artillery. After some interesting movements, the entire force re-formed and marched in slow time by the General, which occupied the amusements of the day.

The 75th Regiment have left Newry, for Ennis, and the Depot Companies of the 77th Regiment, are on a route to Sligo, where they are to be quartered.

On Tuesday the 65th Regiment, under Colonel Maitland, quartered in Clonmel, fired a *feu-de-joie*, in honor of the King's Birth Day.

The grand division of the 5th Foot arrived at Drogheda, on Saturday last, in the Joseph Green Transport, from St. Lucie; and, on the same day, detachments of several Regiments in the Mediterranean arrived.

The 35th Regiment have replaced the 5th at St. Lucie.

The following passengers have arrived at Portpatrick in the Sovereign transport, Lieutenant Kehal, Major-General Sir Charles Doyle, Major-General Sir Charles Doyle, Captain Fraser and Dr. James, the Royal Artillery; Major Peddie and Lieut. G. G. 95th Regiment; Captain Kirwan and Captain G. G. 94th Regiment; Lieutenant Ravencroft, 64th Regiment; Lieutenant Jefferies, 80th Regt. and Major Butt, of the 80th Regiment. The Sovereign has brought three Asses, of unrivalled beauty, as a present to His Majesty.

The whole of the Yeomanry Corps in Scotland are to be assembled in July or August, for inspection by the General Officer.

Captain Cox, of Glenview, late of the 39th Regiment, has been appointed to succeed Major L'Estrange, as Adjutant of the King's County Militia.

Sir William Boothby, Bart. Deputy Chairman of the Board of Customs in London, and acting resident Commissioner at Edinburgh, has been succeeded in that place by Mr. Richmond, lately employed in a similar capacity at the head of the Board in Dublin.

The Hon. George O'Callaghan landed in Drogheda, Wednesday evening, by the Superb Steam Packet, from Bristol.

Last week, as six men were drinking at Kilbenny, in this County, near the borders of Tipperary, a dispute arose between two brothers named Mahony, and two men named John English and John Cull. The parties assailed each other, and English was killed on the spot with stone. Cull was struck with a heavy shovel, knocked down, trampled on, and his bowels ruptured, after which the horrid savages cut off one of his ears, and part of his jaw with the same implement.

On Saturday, John Deegan, a hatter, was murdered near Ballyragget, Kilkenny, and flung into a shallow pond.

Eleven cows stolen from near Tipperary were secured on Tuesday, by the Police at Frownstown, Co. Waterford, while preparing to be shipped for England.

On Thursday, a discovery was made at Clonmel, of thirteen or fourteen sheep buried in a garden, belonging to two persons named Kennedy, who, with William O'Connell, an accomplice, have been apprehended by the Magistrates.

On Friday night, eleven heifers were stolen from Ballyglass, near Tipperary.

On Monday night, a house in the barony of S. near Drogheda, the property of Simon Owens, Esq. maliciously set on fire and burned. The former had been ejected.

A large reward has been offered for the apprehension of the fellows, who committed a burglary and rob 122, at the house of Mr. John Fitz-Gibbon, near Mitchel 12.

At Kilbaha, County Clare, a man was killed from a mule on Friday.
