the period fixed by these regulations will not be extended
with respect to the individuals to whom they refer; also,
that no Officer above the age of sixty years, who shall
avail himself of the option of promotion to the higher
regimental rank on half-pay, shall be allowed to dispose
of that half-pay; certificates of age must therefore, in
every case, accompany the application to sell.

The individuals who shall be disposed to take advantage
of the first part of this arrangement, upon the terms spe-
cified, shall make application to the Commander-in-Chief,
through the Military Secretary; such application to be
transmitted by their respective Commanding Officers,
within One Month after they shall have become acquaint-
ed with the arrangement.

As one of the objects of this arrangement is to secure
to Regiments the services of effective and efficient Field
Officers and Captains, it is his Majesty's pleasure that the
arrangement, so far as it provides for the removal of Bre-
tagnon to half-pay, with Promotion to the Regimental
Rank, shall be imperative with those holding Staff Situa-
tions, unless they shall prefer giving up their Staff
Situations, and upon this point they are required to make
an immediate communication to the Military Secretary,
for his Royal Highness the Commander-in-Chief's infor-
mation.

The Mayor has placed Policemen and Constables on
the different avenues leading to this City, to prevent fore-
stalling potatoes. It is not generally known, that persons
purchasing potatoes on the roads, which are bringing to
market, are liable to a severe penalty; and the Mayor
is determined to punish all persons so offending, with the
utmost rigour of the law.

At eight o'clock, on Monday morning, the Mayor
held an inquest at the County Jail, on the body of
Michael Dobbin, who died the preceding day of fever—
he was between 70 and 80 years of age, and was con-
fined for illegally cutting timber near Glin.

Major-General Sir Thomas M'Mahon, Bart. late
Adjutant-General in India, accompanied by Lady

It is singular that the 4th Foot or King's Own, which

in this neighbourhood which would have given them time
to reach Ballinasloe with their purchases, it does not por-
tend well for that species of stock. The fair of Croagh
also bore much the same character.
