on his knees; and deliberately discharged a blunderbuss at
him, which killed him on the spot. After rifling the
house of a considerable quantity of money and valuable
articles, they left the place.

Eight fairs were held in various parts of this County
on Monday, and were attended by great crowds, as the
day was a holiday. Information was conveyed to Mr.
Vokes, Chief Magistrate, that a preconcerted fight was to
take place between two adverse parties of 500 men each,
at the fair of Cluggin; and that Gentleman accordingly
appeared there with a party of Police, to prevent, if possi-
ble, a wanton effusion of blood. The rioters conceiving
the Police were intimidated by their great numbers, boldly
entered the field and commenced the conflict. Mr. Vokes
marked one of the ringleaders and pursued him—the fellow
would not surrender, and threatened the Magistrate if he
attempted to seize him. Mr. Vokes fired and shot the
rioter in the leg; he was immediately made prisoner, and
this early act of determination had a salutary effect on his
misguided associates, who dispersed in all directions, with-
out gratifying their sanguinary disposition. Some partial
fighting however took place in the evening, when the

parties were going home, and one of the rioters was
judged the preliminaries for the intended battle were
well arranged, when one faction had erected a tent conven-
ient to the fair as a rendezvous for refreshing and organi-
zing their force.

Some desperate riots occurred at the fairs of Stonehall
and Ballygarry, on the same day, and two men were
killed in a regular pitched battle at the former. The
Police establishment could not send a sufficient force to
all the places where it was necessary on Monday last.

The fair of Ballygarry, on Monday, was rather dull,
the prices of stock were high and but little sales were
effected. The continued dry weather has not served
the cattle fairs.

On Saturday evening, the Mayor held an inquest at
the City Court House, on the body of Denis Spellacy,
who was found dead in a field above the Gas-House, a
few hours previous. A strong suspicion prevailed, that
the unfortunate man came to his death from some noxious
drug administered by a quack Doctress, named Warren,
under whose care he had placed himself for the cure of a
certain disorder. To investigate the case fully, the Mayor
adjourned the inquest to Monday; and, in the interim,
the body was opened by Surgeon Thwaites, and the
contents of the stomach analysed. The result proved the
fallacy of the report in circulation, for it appeared that he
died of apoplexy, and the Jury returned a verdict accord-
ingly.

On Monday, a large concourse of persons assembled at
Grant's bog, Cork, and paraded the streets of that City
with a vast mass, with placards, on which were inscribed,

"We want employment; ourselves and our families are
starving." They drew up an address to the Mayor on
their distressed condition, and were met by Mr. Sheriff
appearing, while proceeding to present it. This gentle-
man, while in the act of gently remonstrating with the
leaders, was struck by some fellow in the crowd, cut in
the face, and obliged to fly for protection. Things began
to wear a very alarming aspect, the peace officers brought
up the military, and the 5d Dragoon Guards cleared the
streets of this riotous assembly, without any further vio-
lence. The Mayor has since consented to receive a depu-
tation from the unemployed operatives.

On Sunday a farm house in Killocten, in this County,

girl. A feeble old man narrowly escaped the flames.
