At an early hour, on Thursday evening, a small of
boat, containing two gentlemen and three ladies, a

non-Quay. Fortunately, a ferry-boat was near and put
up immediately to their assistance, when, with consi-
derable exertion, the five persons were rescued from the
perilous condition, and conveyed ashore. One of the
females was extremely exhausted, and very narrowly
escaped the gaping abyss that opened for her destruction.

About eleven o'clock, yesterday morning, the body of
Mr. James Halloran, of Coonagh, in the North Liberties,
missing since the night of the 2d February last, was un-
floating by two fishermen near little Kilrush. The body
when taken up was in a very decayed state, but on close
examination no marks of violence could be observed,
while a silver watch and snuff box were found in the
pockets of his clothes. From these circumstances, it was
reasonably presumed, that no undue measures had been
used to accelerate his death as had been supposed, and the
Mayor having summoned an inquest, the Jury after a
patient investigation, returned a verdict "found drowned."

At the City Court House, yesterday evening, the
Mayor held an inquest on the body of a black sailor boy
named Alfred, belonging to the Exchange, of Baltimore,
Captain Mouat. It appeared he was drowned in April
last, while attempting to escape from that vessel, then
lying in Grass Island, by swimming ashore. A general
but it is hoped an erroneous idea was prevalent, that he
had been driven to this fatal alternative by the frequent
severity of the master, but no testimony to confirm such
a belief was offered on the inquest. It is rather an ex-
traordinary circumstance, that those parts of his person
which were not protected by the clothes, had become
completely of a white color, but produced, it is conjec-
tured, by the combined effects of the water and the atmos-
phere. This was strikingly apparent in the hands, feet,
and face, and contrasted with other parts, formed a very
curious anomaly.
