This day the Writs were received by the County and City Sheriffs—the latter have fixed the Election for this City for Tuesday next. That for the County will, we believe, take place on or about the 22d instant.

A thatched house and all its contents, were burned on Sunday night, at Ballyvara, in the Liberties—whether accidentally or maliciously is uncertain, but the owner, Thomas Kelly, narrowly escaped with his family.

On Saturday night last, a number of men armed with scythes &c. burned a house, in Upper Connell's, in this County, the late tenant being ejected; they afterwards visited a farmer, shewed him the burning ruins, and enjoined him to be charitable, and subsequently killed several calves.

Six Constables from each of the Baronies in the County Tipperary, have been ordered to Middlethird to increase the force in that district and to quell disturbances.

Yesterday, the Mayor held an inquest at the County Infirmary, on the body of Sarah Kenny, who, it appeared, was dreadfully burned in April last, while smoking a pipe. A verdict of accidental death was returned.

A detachment of the 29th Regiment, proceeded from Cork, for Spike Island, to relieve the remainder of the 63d Regiment, ordered to Chatham. This day the 29th Regiment will embark at Cove, in the Valleyfield, and Diadem transports, for the Mauritius.

On Saturday, the garrison of Cork, comprising a Brigade of Artillery, Colonel Smith; 3d Dragoon Guards, Colonel Holmes; 19th Regiment, Colonel M'Donnell; and 29th Regiment, Colonel Sir John Buchan, were reviewed by General Sir George Bingham, accompanied by a numerous staff. The troops when formed in line, presented a very fine appearance and went through a variety of evolutions with precision and effect.

A squadron of the Scots Greys will be stationed in Waterford, for a short time.

The 6th Carbineers are on their march back again from the disturbed districts to the Cavalry Barracks in Canterbury. Upon their arrival the two troops of the 8th Hussars will also return to Brighton.

The depot of the 1st Royals marched on Monday, from Gosport, for Chatham.

Orders have been issued from the Recruiting Department, to suspend further enlisting for the following Regiments stationed in India, their establishments being over compleat, viz.:—2d, 14th, 20th, 30th, 40th and 60th Regiments of Infantry.

Detachments for the 3d (Buffs) and 30th Regiment have embarked as guards in the Boyne Convict Ship, for New South Wales.

Major Marley has been appointed Barrack-master of Bantry, in the room of the late Robert Kenney, Esq.

The costume of the British Army is to be altered in December next—instead of jackets, long coats with single breasts are to be worn.

In future soldiers who claim pensions for service only, who are discharged at the Regiment, and not required to attend the Chelsea board, are to receive one shilling a day for thirty days after their discharge, and eighteen pence a day for the number of days' march from the place they were enlisted in. The distance is to be calculated according to the British mile.

Mr. Vesey Fitzgerald, M. P. is about to be elevated to the peerage.
