At the earnest and repeated requests of these poor people, who were most desirous of all the benefits of their Religion, and who had been visited only from time to time by the Missionaries of the adjoining districts, a Pastor, the Rev. Mr. THOMSON, has been established among them. This venerable Gentleman has many difficulties to contend with, but, in particular, he feels deeply the want of a neat and convenient House, in which to assemble for the purpose of performing the spiritual duties properly those spiritual duties which he owes to the people committed to his charge. To remove this objection, he has resolved, if possible, to erect a Chapel, in the town of Ayr, where a considerable portion of his congregation resides. But as he cannot hope to carry his plan into execution, with what his own people collect, and the contributions of the poorer class, and have to support the families by their daily labour, he is under the necessity of appealing to the charity and generosity of the friends of the cause, and it is with confidence that he addresses himself to the public, and gives birth to those whose cause he advocates.

We are feelingly impressed with the unhappy situation of Mr. Thomson's mission, and we give our hearty approval to the means he is using for its improvement. We do heartily therefore, recommend him to the sympathy of his Brethren in their spiritual journey, who wish to see Religion preserved among them.
