The dispute originated from an altercation about the bribery oath, but, after a discharge of two shots each, the principals shook hands, and the affair terminated without injury to either.

At the close of the Poll in the County Louth, yesterday, the numbers were as follow: - Dawson, 852; Foster, 543; Fortescue, 532.

In the County Louth, Mr. Foster's and Mr. Fortescue's voters are escorted to the hustings every morning, by a troop of the 3d Light Dragoons, and on their return have to run gauntlet between an immense mob which assembles for that purpose. The celebrated Mr. Thomas Flanagan, of Sligo, is committed to Gaol, for assaulting Mr. John Bourke, Clerk of the Peace, and has not yet found bail. Mr Flanagan is since liberated.

The Hon. Butler Clarke was chaired through Castle Comer, on Saturday, and numerous bonfires testified the joy of the population at his election.

In Cavan, on Tuesday, as 32 freeholders of Mr. Coote were entering the town and proceeding to that gentleman's tally room, they were opposed by a gang of desperadoes who fired three shors at them, and then rushed ichester, cutler, among mem with sticks and bayonets. TRALEE JUNE 29. (From a Kerry paper.)

We commenced our Editorial duties this morning under an oppressive weight of grief and sorrow. We are old, and must, even within the scope of recannot recolmuch of the annals of our a circumstance as that we find lect so schuty to detail. As Journalists we are bound, however, to lay before the public an impartial statement of facts, in the regular order of their recurrence, up to the lamentable catastrophe which they led to, and which has thrown the town into the deepest mourning. On Sunday last, about the hour of two o'clock, the

stores of Mr. Bruce, which are immediately adjoining the Court-house, were attacked by a mob, under the impression that a large number of Lord Ventry's Freeholders were secreted there, and they proceeded to such acts of outrage that a party of the Rifle Brigade was obliged to be sent into town from the barracks for the protection of the place. The military succeeded, after some time and exertion, in dispersing the crowd of rioters, and as the deluded people passed through the square, they were addressed from the windows of his house by Mr. George Hickson, a Magistrate, who strongly advised them to retire peaceably; by these means tranquillity for the moment was restored-happy would it have been, had that tranquillity continued, and that we were spared the painful duty of laying before our readers the calamitous transacti ons of the day.

Colonel Crosbie's exertions during this disturbance, and for the prevention of riot for the whole day, were active and unremitting.

About four o'clock, a parcel of infuriated fellows, probably in a state of intoxication, set out towards Blennerville, in order as it was said to intercept any Freeholders in Mr. Hare's interest coming in from the Western Barony, (Corkaguiny,) and a party of mounted and other Police, went out from this town, accompanied by Major Mullins, George Rowan, Esq. and Roger O'Sullivan, Esq. Sub-Sheriff, to protect these Freeholders and escort them into town; and we have been informed, that some rioting did actually occur at Blennerville.

On the evening of that day about seven o'clock, a number of Freeholders on the Ardfert Estate came into the town. With them arrived the Heir of that estate (a child about nine years of age.) On their coming into town they (of course) were surrounded in the streets by multitudes of the populace, who proceeded with them to Colonel Crosbie's Committee Room, which is situate nearly opposite to Devine's Hotel. The crowds were addressed from the windows of the Hotel, by John O'Connell, Esq. and several other Gentlemen, who earnestly advised them peaceably to disperse, and any of them who had votes, to attend at the Hustings on the morrow. The people then did actually retire; and we believe the Ardfert Freeholders were intent on returning to their respective lodgings. At this moment a great number of Freeholders, belonging to the Estate of Lord Ventry, arrived from the Barony of Corkaguiny, accompanied by the Hon. Major Mullins, and several other Gentlemen, and with them, a party of the Constabulary force, and two or three Chief Constables. On the arrival of this party at the end of Nelson-street, they were met by the mob who assembled about the Ardfert Freeholders, and an immediate attack, with stones and other missiles, commenced on the Corkaguiny men, many of whom were very badly used, and they were compelled to fly in all directions for safety. A scene of confusion and riot here ensued, which it is impossible adequately to describe.-We lament to state that the Police and a detachment of the Rifle Brigade, (the Court-House, where they were stationed, having been attacked by the niob,) found it necessary (under the orders of the High Sheriff, and some Magistrates) to fire on the rioters, and we grieve to say, that five lives have been lost, and thirteen persons wounded some dangerously.
