On Tuesday last, as Timothy Driscoll, tenant to Lord
Bantry, was on his return from Castlebar, whither he went
with some luggage of his Lordship's son, the Hon. Sir
White, Ensign 10th Regiment, he was attacked near
Oranmore, County Galway, by two men and a woman,
who robbed him of a pocket-book containing Bank of
Ireland notes to the amount of 10*l.* 5*s.* viz. two 5*l.*
British, and seven 20*s.* notes, and 7*l.* 5*s.* of Leslie's notes,
the numbers of which he has. One of the fellows was
about 5 feet, 9 or 10 inches, thin-spared, with Roman
nose and dark whiskers, with a brown surcoat; the other
middle-sized, with an old blue frock and glazed hat; the
woman young looking, swarthy, with a drab cloak, bound
with light ribbon on her arm—one of them was armed
with a pistol. The man made every resistance, but was
overpowered.

On Thursday, Pat Coffey, from Newport, was appre-
hended by Lieutenant Bindon and a party of his Police,
at Cloulara, on suspicion of cow-stealing, and was finally
committed to abide his trial at the ensuing assizes of Ennis.

Mr. Wilson, who is lodged in Galway gaol, on a charge
of being concerned in a murder at the election, is a most
respectable, intelligent Magistrate of the County Clare;
and it is thought will shew on his trial that he was
not involved in the transaction for which he is now
imprisoned.

On Wednesday night, a wretched woman was detected
in the act of attempting to destroy two new-born infants,
which she said she got in Ennis on that morning to con-
vey to Limerick for 6*s.* each. She is lodged in jail by
the Mayor.

Mr. Arthur Thomas, of Outerard, was found dead
in the street of Galway, on Tuesday night—he was em-
ployed as agent at the election.

Yesterday, the Mayor held an inquest on the body of
William Slattery, who was accidentally drowned, whilst
bathing near the North Strand, on Thursday last.

Thursday last, Patrick Riedy was sentenced by the
Right Worshipful the Mayor, under the Mutiny Act, to
three months' imprisonment, for purchasing regimental
necessaries belonging to a deserter from the 24th Regt.

A large reward is offered for the apprehension of the
murderers of the Rev Charles Minchin.

The Coroners of Tralee have transmitted an account
of the Inquest and Verdict to Government, and requested
to be advised how to proceed, but they have not received
an answer.

Major Willcocks, the Chief Magistrate of Police,
arrived in Tralee on Tuesday evening, having been direct-
ed by orders from the Castle to repair thither from Water-
ford, where he had been during the election for that County,
and where his judicious conduct was the theme of general
approbation.
