On Tuesday and Wednesday last, the streets of Rathkeale were crowded with a large assemblage of people, to the number of some hundreds, wanting employment or some means of purchasing food for their families.—The shopkeepers of the town advised them to desist until Thursday, which they quietly did; and, in the mean time, a large quantity of bread was distributed amongst them. Thomas Lloyd, Esq. M. P., together with the Magistrates, other Gentlemen, and Shopkeepers, entered into a subscription, which, on Thursday, before two o'clock, amounted to over £100.

On Thursday night, Captain Gill's stable, at Rathkeale, was broken into, and robbed of a considerable number of articles.

In consequence of the bridge at Bunnahow having been broken down, a passage has been made through the adjoining land leading to the new road to Gort, for which a toll of six pence on carriages is demanded.

A fund has been established, for receiving proposals and making the necessary arrangements for building a Fever Hospital in Tralee. £3788 has also been appropriated towards creating a fund for the erection of a new Court-House in that town, on the site occupied by the old jail, and £50 for procuring Plans and Estimates, to be laid before the Grand Jury at the next Assizes.

John Mann, who had his leg broken by the wheel of a car, coming to vote at the late County Election, died on Tuesday, in the County Infirmary. His leg was amputated about ten days previous to his death.

Patrick McNamara died same day from the effects of a broken leg, which occurred a month ago at Thomond-Gate, during which he lingered in the Infirmary.

A young fat horse which met with an accident, was purchased in the Liberties a few days since, by two butchers from the Liberties, but their evil intentions were frustrated by the Police, who shot and destroyed the animal on its way to town.

In consequence of the refusal of the Proprietors of some mills in the neighbourhood of Caher to grind wheat for the country people, some men, we have been informed, have been rising through the Country, and collecting men for the purpose of breaking down the wheels, and directing the water to one mill which can work only when other mills stop working.
