THEATRE—It gave us no small degree of pleasure to find that our opinion of Wednesday, in favor of Thursday's performance, was more than confirmed. Of Mr. McCarthy we then spoke with modesty, but now we have no hesitation in pronouncing him a young man perfectly suited to the first line of low Irish Comedy. In *Terry O'Rourke*, in the Irish Tutor, he was perfectly at home; and to those who are well acquainted with the genius, manners, habits, and peculiarities, of the lower orders of our Countrymen, Mr. McCarthy must appear a perfect original—his brogue is excellent, and his features give an expression of comic humour which is absolutely irresistible. Of the Messrs. James we need not say much: they are well known to our readers to be at the head of the profession in the "line of business" they appear in, and they not only prove their taste but what is better their judgment; the young gentleman acquitted himself admirably. Mr. Wallis, too, is a performer of much merit; and, if his voice did not taste more of the *patois*, he might take his range in the first order of actors. Mr. Wynne is perfectly at home in all his parts; his action, voice, gesture, and articulation, prove him a man of taste and talent. Miss McGhie is not only musical in her range, but happy in her acting. We should not omit Mrs. Forde, of whom we have spoken on a former occasion; she is a lady of considerable taste, elegance, and execution, in Comedy as well as Tragedy—she must ever prove a favorite.

DISTILLATION FROM GRAIN.—We perceived in the Dublin papers a paragraph, copied from a Kilkenny Journal, which states that Inspectors were sent by the Government to examine the state of the crops, that, if they were deemed a failure, a stop would be put to the distillation of spirits. On the authority of a gentleman, who had an interview with Mr. Secretary Goulburn upon the subject, we assert that there was no foundation whatever for the rumour. In the event of an extreme scarcity of food such a measure might be resorted to, but we are convinced that the present favourable condition of the late crops will render it altogether unnecessary. Besides, when we consider the great scarcity of hay, and the consequent difficulty of feeding cattle during the ensuing winter, we must admit that, as cows are generally fed with grains, &c. the discontinuance of distillation, near large towns especially, would be extremely injurious.—*Kilkenny Independent*.

DROLL MISTAKES.—The number of the *Westminster Review* just published, contains an exposition of various droll mistakes in the considerably improved fifteenth edition of *Debrett's Peerage*, of which we copy a specimen or two:—Page 1158, Nathaniel Williams, second Lord Clarina, was born 29th May, 1796; married Penelope, daughter of M. R. Westropp, Esq. and by her had a daughter, born 13th of March, 1797—(not quite 10 months after his own birth)—he had afterwards four other children, the last of whom was born in 1805, when their father was little more than seven years old; and his Lordship died in Barbadoes in 1810, aged thirteen years and a few months, after having been the father of five children, a Lieutenant-General in the Army, and Governor of a Colony!—In page 965, a singular circumstance is recorded of the first Viscount O'Neill; he married a lady who died in 1722, yet notwithstanding this little accident, she bore him a son on the 16th of March, 1746, and afterwards a daughter with the date of whose birth Mr. Debrett does not condescend to inform us.—Page 997.—But the most remarkable peculiarity of all exists in the Gormans-ton peerage, which (on account of being an Irish one, we suppose) has descended in regular succession from son to father."
