sense or public duty to the pressing exigency of his health, that, contrary to the urgent remonstrances of his best medical and personal friends, he insisted upon quitting Brighton last Spring, to take an active part in the business of the Irish Committees then sitting in the House of Commons, an effort so much beyond his strength as to provoke the fatal relapse which followed. In private life Mr. Hutchinson was a warmhearted, kind, and guileless gentleman. Within the pale of his family his loss is irreparable; it will also be long felt in the larger circles in which he moved, and more particularly by his constituents, who were attached to him by a deep sense of his long and faithful service. Of this an influential and predominating part of them has recently given a striking poof, as honourable to themselves as it was gratifying to the pure and parting spirit which lingered here just long enough to receive it, by determining that the son of Mr. Hutchinson shall fill the seat which is vacated by his honourable and lament-
