

sense of public duty to the pressing exigency of his health, that, contrary to the urgent remonstrances of his best medical and personal friends, he insisted upon quitting Brighton last Spring, to take an active part in the business of the Irish Committees then sitting in the House of Commons, an effort so much beyond his strength as to provoke the fatal relapse which followed. In private life Mr. Hutchinson was a warmhearted, kind, and guileless gentleman. Within the pale of his family his loss is irreparable; it will also be long felt in the larger circles in which he moved, and more particularly by his constituents, who were attached to him by a deep sense of his long and faithful service. Of this an influential and predominating part of them has recently given a striking proof, as honourable to themselves as it was gratifying to the pure and parting spirit which lingered here just long enough to receive it, by determining that the son of Mr. Hutchinson shall fill the seat which is vacated by his honourable and lamented father.

armed with a pitchfork. One of the assailants presented a gun at him, and fired, but the shot struck a man of their own party, and lodged in his thigh. He was discovered near the spot next morning, and committed to Gaol by the Mayor, before whom Kennedy swore informations.

On Wednesday morning, Lieutenant Carey, C. C. with a party of Police, proceeded to the Glen, near Kilrush, and apprehended a riotous character, named David Conway, for stealing butter, which was found in his possession. He was concealed in a chimney when discovered. Conway's two brothers were transported, and he himself was to be tried at last Spring Assizes for murder, but was discharged for want of prosecution. Conway was committed to Ennis Gaol by R. Borough, Esq.

On Friday night, a deplorable accident took place at Caher.—A young man, Ryan, presented a loaded musket at a young girl, daughter of a Policeman, named Dwyer—the gun went off—the contents lodged in her neck, and her death was almost instantaneous.

On Thursday the Mayor held an inquest on the body of Edward Hayes, of Crossgalla, a fine young fellow, who was killed the previous evening by the bank of a quarry accidentally falling and smothering him.

On the arrival of the Cork Mail Coach in Tralee from Killarney on the evening of Sunday last, a well conducted lad, named Maurice Connell, apprentice, or shop-assistant to Mr. Edward Purcell, of that town, Grocer, who was an outside passenger, wishing to alight as the coach passed his employer's door, called to the Coachman to stop for an instant; and fancying his request had been heard and complied with, incautiously jumped off, when, melancholy to relate, he was struck by the wheel, tumbled on the pavement, and the hind wheel, with the immense weight of the Mail Coach, passed over his body. He still survives; but languishes with scarce any hope of recovery.

A few days since, a respectable farmer, and freeholder, of 100l. per annum, named Richard Horan, residing at Lackbrowder, near Castle Island, returning from Cork on his car, after having sold some butter, was unfortunately killed near Newmarket, Co. Cork, under the following fatal circumstances:—On descending a steep in the road, some firkins on the car got loose, and having touched the horse (which was young) the animal became restive and ungovernable—ran off, and overturned the car, by which poor Horan was killed on the spot, and his servant's arm broken, and otherwise seriously injured. Horan was a real old Irish character, as to hospitality of disposition, harmless hilarity, and suavity of manner.
