orchard, on the lands of Ballyvicamore, in this county,
the estate of Mr. Piggott, repaired to the dwelling-house
of a man named Molony, an industrious farmer; and after
breaking some of his windows, firing a few shots, and forc-
ing Molony to promise by an oath to forgive the orchard
man part of the rent, for the damage done, quietly dis-
persed. Molony having recognised two of the party
summoned them to Ballingarry Petty Sessions. The
night after, three small dwellings of his were burned to
the ground, with their contents. The magistrates have
since committed two of these fellows, named Setright and
Hannan, to our County Jail, to abide their trial at the
next assizes.

A dreadful murder was perpetrated in the house of a
respectable farmer, at Killfenora, County Clare, on Sun-
day, while the family were at mass. The maid servant
was murdered by a sanguinary ruffian, who after execut-
ing the horrid deed, proceeded to rob the house, and fled
with all the portable articles he could find. The Coroner
has proceeded to hold an inquest.

Four men, for administering unlawful oaths, and
committing a burglary and robbery, were transmitted to
the County Jail, on Monday, by Thomas O'Dell, Esq.,
of Ballingarry.

The Sheriffs of the City have received an order from
Government, to transmit the following convicts to Cork
for transportation:—William Cummins, William Whe-
lan, Redmond Welch, and James M'Mahon. The
County High Sheriff has received a similar order to for-
ward seven convicts, six men, and a woman.

On Thursday, Michael O'Connor, a young ruffian,
gave a blow of a rack staff to a man named Kelly, at
Lifford, near Ennis, which fractured the skull of his vic-
tim, who died next day. The deceased was a man of
good character. The Coroner's warrant has been issued
against O'Connor, who has fled.

On Wednesday last, a strange labouring man, of the
name of Denis Myers, fell down in John-street, Cashel,
and almost immediately expired.—The poor man was
from the neighbourhood of Kilmallock.

Another fatal occurrence took place on Thursday eve-
ning, by the sudden fall of a large bank of earth, near Stone-
hall, County Clare, the residence of Thomas M'Mahon,
Esq. A favourite workman of Mr. M'Mahon, named
Thomas Morony, had just sat down under, to wait the
return of the carts that were drawing away the stuff, but
his spine so injured by its falling on his back, that he only
survived a few hours.

On Tuesday, a woman of the name of O'Connor, was
drowned at Fair-hill, Galway, by slipping into a hole
while bathing.

On Thursday night, a robber was disarmed, and taken
into custody near Cahir, by a Constable of the Police.

On Saturday night, a most melancholy and awful cir-
cumstance occurred at Deerpark, near Lismore.—The
dwelling house of a poor man named Lynch, was re-

duced to a heap of ashes, and himself, his wife, and
infant child, and servant-maid, totally consumed in the
flames with all his effects! Not a vestige of the human
form has survived the terrible conflagration, and the
bodies are literally reduced to a cinder. The house of the
unfortunate man was full of unthreshed corn preparing
for market, and which by some fatal accident took fire.

A Gentleman's desk was picked, and robbed of upwards
of 200l., on Sunday last, during his retirement at his
summer residence.—The man who was in care of the
house has been committed, on strong suspicion of being
concerned in the robbery.

The Mayor of Cork, at the request of the inhabitants,
having applied to the Lord Lieutenant on the distressed
state of the labouring classes in that city. Mr. Goulburn
in a letter to the Chief Magistrate, communicates the
intention of his Excellency to appropriate the sum of
200l. towards their relief.

The Convict depot of Cork now contains nearly 200
females under sentence of transportation, 160 of whom
will be embarked this week in the Brothers Transport for
New South Wales.
