The Right Worshipful the Mayor held an inquest on Thursday, at the Court House, on the body of Ann Hehir, in consequence of information that the deceased had come to her death from the violent treatment of her husband. The body was disinterred and minutely examined by Surgeon Franklin, jun. when there appeared a discoloration on the neck, as if the effect of strangulation, and an extensive contusion on the left breast. It was also stated in evidence, that her husband had beaten her severely about a fortnight previous to her death. Under all the circumstances, the Jury found the following verdict:—"Ann Hehir has the marks of two wounds on her neck and body, which we conceive were inflicted by her husband; but whether they were the cause of her death or not we cannot ascertain." The husband, Patrick Hehir, is in custody.

On Tuesday night last, Eugene C. Carey, Esq. of Bruff, proceeded with the Police stationed at Kilmallock, to the lands of Knocktoran, in this County, under the warrant of C. D. Oliver, Esq. and brought in the cattle and other effects, which were rescued on said lands by a furious mob, they also succeeded in bringing in some of the fellows prisoners, who attacked Mr. Carey on said lands—one of whom was found concealed under a heap of straw.

A Rock notice was posted up near Ballinacurra, on Wednesday night, threatening a man, named Garvan, with destruction.

On Wednesday, eight convicts from Galway and three from Castlebar, passed through here on their way to Cork. Amongst those from Galway were the noted felons Owen Cronen, John Fitzgerald, and Michael Brandon.

This day, five male convicts from Sligo, arrived here, under an escort of the 15th Foot, from Nenagh, on their way to Cork, for transportation.

Two men, named Tracy, were drowned off Seafield, in the west of the County Clare, on Tuesday morning, by the upsetting of a canoe. They have both left families. A third man who was in the boat saved himself by swimming.

A valuable Silver Cup, highly chased, transferable and challengeable, has been presented by Eyre Evans, Esq. with his usual liberality, to the Kilmallock Races, which will take place on the first Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, in November next.
