Durick, charged with the same offence, have been apprehended by the Tomgreany and Mount-Shannon Police, and committed to Galway gaol for trial at the next assizes.  
William Donohue's house, near Ballingarry, was broken into on the night of the 2d inst. by a party of armed men, who called him out, gave him a dreadful beating, and forcibly carried away, from a neighbouring house, the daughter of Ellen Burnes, to the County Cork.  
On Wednesday night, one or more persons entered the house of Mr. Kelly, of Heafy-Lodge, near Rathkeale, by descending the chimney.—They robbed it of 10s. in silver, with the clothes of his wife, and every portable article they found.  
On Wednesday, the remains of a farmer, named Hallinan, were about to be buried at Ballingarry, but a report how he came by his death having circulated, the Ballingarry police with the Coroner attended, when it appeared that he died by the stroke of a metal pot given him by his step-daughter, who is at present in Rathkeale Bridewell, and acknowledges her guilt.  
At the sitting of the Insolvent Court in Ennis, on Wednesday, eight debtors were liberated, and two remanded, one named Fitzgerald for two years, and the other, Lyons, for ten months.  
The parishioners of Caherah, County Cork, have compounded with their Rector, the Rev. Mr. Webb, under the Tithe Composition Act, for £650 per year.  
The Very Rev. Dr. Ryan, Coadjutor Roman Catholic Bishop of this Diocese, presided at a Meeting of the Catholic parishioners of St. John's, in the Parochial Chapel, on yesterday.—The resolutions appear in our advertising columns.  
The Lord Bishop of Cloyne is expected at the See House, at Cloyne, in the latter part of next week. His son, the Rev. Mr. Brinkley, and Mr. John Litton, his Lordship's Agent, who is also Solicitor to the Dublin Society for the Suppression of Vice, have already arrived there.  
A species of young shark was yesterday taken in our river at one of the lower quays, which it approached, and thereby got stranded; it is in the possession of Mr George O'Connell, George's-street.  
Cork October fair, on Monday, was well attended.—Cows brought from £10 to £14, good draft horses £20 to £25, lambs 13s. and 14s. each.  
The Potatoes, this season, in Kerry, were never known to be so good and so abundant. The crop is reckoned sufficient to supply the population of the County three times over.  
The crop in the County Clare is in equally prosperous state.  
The County of Limerick For Hoards will be at Kilfinan, at Ten o'Clock, on Tuesday the 10th; at Castle town, at same hour, on Monday the 11th; and at Murphy's cross, at Kilpeacon, on Tuesday, 20th of October Instant, at nine o'Clock.
