The military survey of Ireland is making great progress. The greater part of the counties of Derry and Antrim are finished, and will shortly be published in parish maps of six inches to a mile. As it is the intention of Government that the military survey should be combined with the naval one of the coast, which is to commence next summer, the whole strength of the military corps employed will next commence at Donegal. First in two years the three counties will be complete, and a correct delineation given of the sea coast extending from Sligo Bay to Belfast Lough; one on which there are more lives and property lost, is not to be found in equal extent along the coast of the British Isles.

Yesterday, the Mayor held an inquest on the body of John Connors, who, it appeared, died from the effect of a kick he got at the Races. A verdict of wilful murder was returned against the perpetrator.

A man named Edy Lacy, was killed by a blow from a pitch-fork, at Kilcradon, County Clare, on Tuesday. The perpetrators are known.

Last night, a valuable black Horse, the property of Michael Diegan, Esq. of Ballina, County Tipperary, was maliciously killed on the Lands of Summerhill, near Kilmastulla.

On Monday night, the 9th instant, five sheep, the property of Michael Casey, of Labasheda, were stolen of the lands of Clonlohan, County Clare.—On the following Sunday, Serjeant Jameson, of the Police, stationed at Six-mile-Bridge, received information that the sheep had been brought to that neighbourhood; and, having ascertained that one Halway had sold two of the sheep to a butcher, he apprehended the former, who was committed by Henry Butler, and William O'Brien, Esqrs. to East Gaol, to abide his trial.

The police patrol stopped a man and woman last night, with 13½ yards brown broad-cloth, four shirts, (trimmed,) one shift and one pair of stockings in their possession, supposed to be stolen. The shirts and shifts wet as if taken off the bleach. A purse, with some silver in it, was found in the street by the same patrol.
